Rocks and Soil Samples

Comments from Rev. Clark Stein

"These words I speak to you are not incidental additions to your life, homeowner improvements to your standard of living. They are foundational words, words to build a life on. If you work these words into your life, you are like a smart carpenter who built his house on solid rock. Rain poured down, the river flooded, a tornado hit—but nothing moved that house. It was fixed to the rock. But if you just use my words in Bible studies and don't work them into your life, you are like a stupid carpenter who built his house on the sandy beach. When a storm rolled in and the waves came up, it collapsed like a house of cards."

Matthew 7: 24-27

A man became disenchanted with the city life he was living. He decided to move to the country and start a chicken farm. He bought a farmhouse with some land around it, moved in, and bought 200 baby chicks. But they all quickly died. He bought 200 more baby chicks but, again, they all died a short time later. Puzzled and distressed, the man wrote to the county agricultural agent and described everything that had happened. He concluded his letter, "I want very much to be a successful chicken farmer. Therefore, can you tell me: Have I been planting the chicks too close together or too deep?" Whereupon the county agent wrote back and said, "I can't answer your question until you send me a soil sample."



Interested in a quiet, remote, prayerful weekend with your maker? Consider BUMC's annual trip to The Abbey of Genesee, a Roman Catholic community of monks. Dedicated to the worship of God in a hidden life within the monastery following the Rule of St. Benedict, the monks there lead a life of solitude and silence, prayer and penance in a joyful spirit of faith.

Come to the Abbey and follow the worship schedule of the monks. Worship, pray, meditate, conference with a monk, hike, eat, and sleep. Your single room is furnished with a bed, a writing desk and a comfortable chair. At the prayer services, you will hear and participate in the chanting of the psalms.

You will live from Friday afternoon until Sunday afternoon in total silence. This may sound daunting.... And yet we remind each other that it is in silence that we can hear the still, small voice of God.

What is Malaria?

- ♦ Malaria is a mosquitoborne deadly disease.
- About half of the world's population is at risk for malaria.
- ♦ Every 30 seconds, a child dies from malaria.

Where's Mali?

- ♦ Mali is a country in western Africa.
- ♦ It's about twice the size of Texas.
- Mosquito infestations are heaviest in southern Mali (where the Niger River flows) especially during the rainy season.

How Can You Help?

- ♦ Join our VBS kids to help meet the goal of providing more than 1 million specially treated mosquito bed nets to at-risk kids. Drop your donation in Sunday's collection plate with a note "Malaria Nets."
- ♦ One \$6 net can protect two children for up to four years.

Vacation Bible School **2012**

BUMC Youth Group Completes Work Project

In the early morning hours of July 8, a group of dedicated BUMC volunteers gathered in the church parking to begin their journey to Rushville, IN. Nestled halfway between the metropolitan centers of Indianapolis, IN and Cincinnati, OH, Rush County & Rushville is an agricultural community where residents awaken to the quiet of a morning countryside and the close-knit warmth of neighbors. Its distance to larger cities is part of its grace. Yet its location has not shielded its residents from the effects of the economy with automotive parts plants closings and layoffs. In this beautiful setting, our youth had the opportunity to reach out and help both young and old alike, while making some new friends along the way.

In the course of a week, our YSP team provided home repairs at no cost for elderly, disabled, and disadvantaged people in need. Most project crews served the same resident for the entire week, allowing them to develop meaningful relationships. Many projects were designed to be completed during the week, allowing youth to experience the satisfaction of a job well done. Some of the projects included interior and exterior painting, building and repairing porches and wheelchair ramps, building and repairing steps, weatherization and other home repairs.

Isaiah 58:9-11

The Message (MSG)
6-9"This is the kind of fast day
I'm after: to break the chains of
injustice, get rid of exploitation
in the workplace, free the oppressed, cancel debts.

What I'm interested in seeing you do is: sharing your food with the hungry, inviting the homeless poor into your homes, putting clothes on the shivering ill-clad, being available to your own families. Do this and the lights will turn on, and your lives will turn around at once. Your righteousness will pave your way. The God of glory will secure your passage. Then when you pray, God will answer. You'll call out for help and I'll say, 'Here I am.'

Nestled among the businesses near the intersection of Broadview and Brookpark Roads, is the American Indian Education Center. Despite its relatively small size, it is an important center of activity for the American Indians of Northeast Ohio. On Thursday nights, young people come together to participate in activities that are important in the Indian culture. Most of them are doing crafts such as making moccasins, while others are learning the art of drumming, an essential part of Native American dances, as you can see in the pictures. Because the activities go from 5 - 8 PM, the young people come right from school and are not able to get a nutritious evening meal. The Center's tight budget can not support providing a meal for the participants. So, volunteers from our church have been providing home cooked meals to these young people. Jim and Linda Rollins provided a delicious venison chili dinner in the pictures above.
