Help Somebody and Help Yourself

The best way to spread Christmas cheer is singing loud for all to hear." A couple weeks before Christmas I learned just how true these words are.

On December 11th, two groups of carolers from Brecksville UMC went out to spread Christmas cheer. I expected the smiling faces of the church members who opened the door—they were happily surprised by this act of love. What I didn't expect was the impact of our singing beyond those to whom it was aimed.

At one house, we shouted "Merry Christmas!" as we got done caroling and immediately heard, "Hey! Come over here!" We walked a couple of houses down, and then caroled to a woman's elderly mom and aunt who both had mobility issues.

Then, we were caroling to one of our members who lived in an apartment building, and neighbors came out onto their balconies, saying, "We never get anything like this here! This is wonderful!" And as we walked back to our cars, another neighbor shouted "Do you want Christmas cookies?!" The answer was, of course, "Yes!" So we walked over and sang to a family who had multiple generations together to bake Christmas cookies.

I could see the pure joy on their faces, and how this simple act of singing showed them the love of Christ that the season is all about. As we sang to that family of strangers, I couldn't help but laugh. While we intended to sing and bring cheer to our people, God used the opportunity to remind me that we are called to bring cheer to all people.

In January, we begin a 6-week series called "Get Off Your Donkey,"

focusing on the parable of the Good Samaritan. This is one of Jesus' most well-known stories, and it has so much to teach us. So much so that we'll be using the book by Reggie McNeal to help us dig into this story both in worship and through discussions in Sunday School.

I'm both excited for this series, and a little bit nervous. Nervous because I know that if we actually listen to what Jesus is teaching in this story and allow it to impact us, it could be world-changing.

What would happen if, when we saw someone hurting, we—like the Samaritan—got off our donkey and did something about it rather than simply making a comment or thinking to ourselves, "Someone should do something."

In the weeks leading up to Christmas each year, I hear people (Christians) complain, "No one is focused on Jesus anymore—everyone is so stressed and doesn't remember the reason for the season. If they came to church they would hear the story, but no one comes to church anymore."

I hear the complaints, and I get it. I want people to focus on Jesus—to come hear the stories and remember that God's love came down to dwell with us at Christ's birth. That's the good stuff of Christmas!

And yet, if we just complain about it and don't turn that observation into action, we're just like the two people who walked on the other side of the road, not helping the person in need.

When we were caroling to those strangers, I realized, "Ohhhhh... this is doing something! This is reminding people—people who probably won't come to church—the reason for the season! This is what it is to be the church!"

This series, "Get Off Your Donkey" is going to call us out of our comfort, and—if we're willing—help us to live into God's mission of "love your neighbor" no matter where we find ourselves between Sundays, and no matter who our neighbor might be.

At the end of this series, on February 19th, we're going to put all we've been talking about into action and do something. That Sunday, rather than the way we typically worship, we will worship by packing 35,000 meals to go to people in need. We will "workship" together.

As you read this, I hope you feel the nervous-excitement, too. This energy of the Holy Spirit that is just waiting to burst through us and into the world, so that the world may know of God's redeeming love...in incredible ways we haven't even imagined yet!



What's all this "Disaffiliation" Stuff about?

As we hear about more churches choosing to disaffiliate from The United Methodist Church, I wanted to take a moment and remind us of how we got here.

The United Methodist Church was founded in 1968, with the coming together of the Methodist Episcopal and the Evangelical United Brethren denominations. Then, in 1972, at the first General Conference of the newly formed United Methodist Church, the first discussions and disagreements about homosexuality and the Church were had.

Fast-forward to 2019, when a special session of General Conference (the top governing body of The UMC) was called to specifically address the church's ongoing disagreement over homosexuality.

The Council of Bishops recommended this special session in order that "the General Conference defer all votes on human sexuality and refer this entire subject to a special Commission, named by the Council of Bishops, to develop a complete examination and possible revision of every paragraph in our Book of Discipline regarding human sexuality." The goal was to keep our global denomination united and move beyond our impasse.

The special commission, called the Commission on a Way Forward, offered a report to the 2019 General Conference. Included in this report were three plans for the future of the church, on which GC 2019 were to vote. One plan allowed but did not require the ordination and marriage of LGBTQ+ United

FINANCE UPDATE


We are SO CLOSE to hitting our 2023 Stewardship Campaign goal. We have received 99 pledges for \$422,863 compared to 133 received last year for \$453,485. Branching out in service happens in some unexpected ways! With an "empty nest" after his daughter went off to college, Rick Krause went looking for some new experiences and connections.

He found connection attending Dawnbreakers Breakfasts on Wednesday mornings in Fellowship Hall. This friendly, casual group meets weekly for devotions and conversation—and great food prepared by chef Dave Smith!

Rick also found an opportunity to serve others through a Cuyahoga County volunteer income tax preparation program—Cuyahoga EITC Coalition one of the largest anti-poverty initiatives in our county.

"Not that any of us like doing taxes, but I've always done my own taxes and I thought this is something I might be interested in." Four years later, he's still at it! The program helps those earning less than \$60,000 get the tax refunds they're entitled to under the Earned Income Tax Credit and the Child Tax Credit.

"You see people from all walks of life. Very young people, never having filed before. Single parents. Married couples with kids. Recent immigrants trying to figure out how this all works." Some don't have access to computers or the internet.

Rick volunteers once or twice a week at the Parma Library on Snow Road from January through mid-April and said that the training and resources provided are top notch. "I find that 9 out of 10 people are incredibly appreciative of the service and the fact that you're willing to help."

Methodists, one plan created three values-based conferences churches could join,

and one plan—the Traditional Plan maintained the denomination's ban on weddings and ordinations of LGBTQ+ individuals, and increased the penalties for clergy who violated those bans.

By a difference of only 54 votes, General Conference supported the Traditional Plan. "What resulted was a denomination with a broken heart and United Methodists with heels dug in."

The 2019 special session of General Conference also added a new paragraph to the Book of Discipline, allowing local churches to disaffiliate from The UMC and keep their church building. (Before the addition of this paragraph, leaving the denomination meant closing the local church, and church property going to the annual conference board of trustees.)

The provisions of the new disaffiliation paragraph expire Dec. 31, 2023, which explains some of the current urgency for churches in this discernment process. There are more than 40,000 United Methodist churches worldwide, and currently, about 5% of churches have voted to disaffiliate since 2019.

It's important to note that local churches are not required to vote on affiliation or disaffiliation. No congregational action is necessary for United Methodist churches to remain part of The UMC. Brecksville United Methodist Church has not voted, and I can say with confidence that our theology fits firmly within the "big tent" of The United Methodist Church.

The next General Conference of The United Methodist Church will take place April 23-May 4, 2024, in Charlotte, North Carolina. At that General Conference, delegates will make decisions that will impact the future of The United Methodist Church. I am an alternate delegate to General Conference, and will be participating in the conversation, discernment, and voting.

I will do my very best to keep our church updated on any goings on in the greater United Methodist Church. If you have questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact me! - *Take care, Pastor Heidi*


