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Isaiah 42:1-4 "Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my spirit upon him; he will bring forth justice to the nations. He will not cry or lift up his voice, or make it heard in the street; a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice. He will not grow faint or be crushed until he has established justice in the earth; and the coastlands wait for his teaching."

I have read this passage of scripture many, many times. I have long been fascinated by the servant songs in Isaiah's writings. They paint a wonderful portrait of a peace filled person who is deeply committed to justice. These are inspirational portraits, and many scholars claim that they point squarely to Jesus. It is interesting conjecture, and allows for good conversation, but I put that aside for now.

What strikes me lately are the methods by which this justice will become known: "He will not cry or lift up his voice, or even make it heard in the street...A bruised reed he will not break...a dimly burning wick he will not quench. He will not grow faint or be crushed until he has established justice in the earth."

We live in such a loud culture. Bright lights and loud noises dominate the day and night. Commercials play at a higher volume than our TV shows, and even prayer times in the middle of church are interrupted by the ring tones of cell **phones. We have gotten quite used to interruptions, and the volume doesn't** seem to bother us. Even those seeking justice in our day and age yell through megaphones at assemblies of like-minded folks, and we all know that the squeaky wheel is the one that gets the attention. We are a noisy bunch.

Isaiah paints a different portrait for lasting change. It is a peace filled movement, it seems to me that has an abiding effect. A servant of justice in this portrait lives out this commitment in a way that doesn't hurt others. It seems a steady, committed, centered, quiet, determined, faithful life makes all the difference.

We approach our summertime. It generally agrees with this kind of pace. People seem to slow down a bit, relax, take it easy, and soak things in. We grant ourselves a sense of pace that is harder to sanction in other seasons of life. Possibilities for quiet moments seem a bit more prevalent. We have made a bold statement here about inclusion. It is about opening our arms, hearts, doors a bit wider that some folks we know and some we haven't met yet might just feel a bit safer and more comfortable here. Hospitality is one of those quiet committed things. It comes from a peaceful center that can always make room for one more.

I am trying to grow into one of those centered, quiet witnesses that work to bring about justice by living a committed, peaceful life. This notion inspires me enough to try and seek more of it out as we enter the summer. I pray peace and quiet for you. Blessings,



Christian Love In Action BUMC Team Prepares for Russia Trip

Please join us in prayer for a peaceful resolution for the people the Ukraine and Russia. As the international situation unfolds, our VIM team continues preparation in anticipation that our late June trip to two Russian orphanages can proceed. This trip is part of the Russia Initiative to foster rebirth of the Methodist Church across that country.

This year, 27 volunteers from the East Ohio Conference, including six from our church: Tony Cipolla, Bruce McCrodden, Michael Sheplavy, Lynn Spencer, Dianne Urdzik and Bill Webb, will work at two orphanages at Fatezh and Oboyan in the Kursk Oblast.

Our church has been asked to bring sports and recreation equipment for boys and girls ages 5-18. We would ask for contributions of any number items including: balls, jump ropes, games, puzzles, temporary tattoos, sidewalk chalk, etc. They can be new or gently used. These can be left in the box marked Russia VIM in the coat room outside Fellowship Hall by Sunday, June 15th.

Your representatives have personally seen how the Russian students benefit substantially from the willingness of our church and its members to share both their time and material contributions. Please keep the Ukraine/Russia situation, Kursk students, care givers and VIM team in your prayers. Thank you.—*Bruce McCrodden*

Looking for a way to be of service this summer?



Help Us Build Buckets *Can you donate any of the following?* Bring them to church on Sunday!

- 5-gallon bucket with resealable lid. Buckets from fastfood restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned; Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner; Advertisements on the outside are acceptable.
- Liquid laundry detergent. 50oz. or 25-oz. bottles only.
- Liquid household cleaner. 12 -16 oz. liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water; no spray cleaners.
- Dish soap. 16-28 oz. bottle any brand.
- 1 can air freshener. Aerosol or pump.
- Insect repellant spray. 6-14 oz. aerosol or spray pump with protective cover.
- Scrub brush. Plastic or wooden handle.
- Cleaning wipes. Handi Wipes or reusable wipes; No terry cleaning towels.
- Sponges. No cellulose sponges due to mold issues
- Scouring pads. No stainless steel, Brillo pads, or SOS pads (nothing with soap built in).
- Clothespins
- Clothesline One 100-ft. or two 50-ft. lines; Cotton or plastic.
- 24-roll heavy-duty trash bags. 33- to 45-gallon sizes
- 5 dust masks
- Kitchen dishwashing gloves Should be durable enough for multiple uses
- 1 pair work gloves. Cotton with leather palm or all leather.

The Methodist circuit riders of early America were a faithful group of young men who were committed to ministry. Day after day they rode, drenched with rain and the waters they encountered as they crossed creeks and rivers, sore from the saddle and exhausted from the circuits they covered. Some ministered to small circuits of three to four churches, while others had much larger territories, upwards of three hundred miles! On average, they earned \$100 annually. They struggled along hard and difficult trials, but carried on faithfully telling the nation about God.

Early Methodist settlers in Brecksville were guided spiritually by James Rowe, Solomon Manear, John Pardo, Orin Gilmore, Joab Ragan, John Crawford and James Taylor and others. Between 1823 and 1910, ninety different men served the Brecksville Methodist Society and the Brecksville Methodist Episcopal Church as circuit riders.

Methodists circuit riders seemed to be everywhere. Richmond Nolley, a circuit rider making his way through a remote area in Mississippi, noticed a fresh set of wagon tracks. He was not the type to pass up the opportunity to make a new contact, so he followed the tracks to a fresh clearing, where a settler was still unloading his wagon. Nolley introduced himself and was greeted with tremendous disgust as the settler burst out, "Another Methodist preacher? I left Virginia to get clear of them! There they got my wife and daughter. So I come here, and here is one before I can get my wagon unloaded!" As the story goes, Nolley replied, "My friend, if you go to Heaven you'll find Methodist preachers there. If you go to Hell, I'm afraid you'll find some there, too. So you had better come to terms with us on earth and be at peace."

The trail was physically demanding. As one pioneer preacher records: "Every day I have to swim through creeks or swamps, and I am wet from head to feet. Some days from morning to night I am dripping with water. My horse's legs are now skinned and rough to his hock joints, and I have rheumatism in all my joints . . . What I have suffered in body and mind my pen is not able to communicate to you. But this I can say, while my body is wet with water and chilled with cold, my soul is filled with heavenly fire. I can say with Saint Paul, 'But none of these things shall move me. Neither count I my life dear unto

myself, so that I might finish my course with joy."

Life on the trail for these intense preachers was so demanding that half of them died before the age of thirtythree. Richmond Nolley, mentioned above, died at age 24 from exposure. However, many thrived on the severity of trail life despite the hardships, including Peter Cartwright who likely held the record for stamina with seventy-one years of itinerancy.

One of the most famous Methodist circuit riders was Francis Asbury who clearly had a strong and deep devotion to God and the nation of America. He came from England as a missionary to America in 1771 and was so busy with preaching that he often only had time to study the Bible while in the saddle. Though he was often plaqued with illness, he continued preaching regularly. He even continued to visit his circuits when he was so ill that he had to be tied to the saddle to remain upright.

Part of the difficulty of the trails that these men blazed was the uncertainty of lodgings. They often stayed with compassionate families, or slept at inns or out in the open. One itinerant, Thomas Ware, sought shelter after a long and weary day at a secluded cabin in the back country of North Carolina. The man of the house made it immediately known that Ware was not welcome. Ware recounts that he "looked at him, and, smiling, said, 'that would depend upon our comparative strength." The young man was unwilling to wrestle the preacher, so Thomas Ware stayed in the cabin that night and baptized the family's children the next morning.

An illustration of these men's faithfulness to carry on, through the hardships of the journey, the loneliness of the trail, poor health, bad weather and the uncertainty of a place to sleep, was the stormy day proverbial saying, "There is nothing out today but crows and Methodist preachers."

These Methodists who were "everywhere, and in every weather" spread the message of Christ throughout the land, changing the nation, religion and most importantly, the lives of those to whom they preached. With the strength and love of God, they answered the need of a hungry nation, and fulfilled the call of God in their own lives.—Jenny Gee, Director of Christian Education

Garden of Eatin' Changes the World One Carrot at a Time

Yes, carrots can change the world. So can tomatoes, corn, beet greens, squash, peppers and garlic.

Five years ago, a healthy handful of church members some with green thumbs and some without — at Bartlesville First Church in Oklahoma got on their knees, emptied seed packets and dug their hands into the dirt. They were growing an idea: the idea of having a community garden.

It's no coincidence that more than 30 volunteers planted the first radishes, turnips and cucumbers on Change the World Day in 2010.

May 17-18 marked the fifth annual Change the World event — a denomination-wide effort encouraging local congregations to show that God is at work in communities. United Methodists go outside the walls of their sanctuaries and help others in their neighborhoods by doing everything from park cleanups and school repairs to bringing meals to senior citizens and stocking food pantries.

It was Bartlesville's mission committee that first decided to turn a quarter-acre of cow pasture into the "Garden of Eatin'." They set the land aside after buying 64 acres on which to build. Since then, more than 30 people have kept their hands in the soil.

"We saw the new land as a corner of the world where we could make a difference," said C.J. Shell, one of the original supporters of the garden. "Change the World gave us the time, the excuse and the people to get it all done and to make it into a project that will last."

"Without Change the World, we wouldn't have gotten it off the ground so quickly."

Ever-bigger harvests

The plot has survived drought, floods and hot temperatures, but bounces back year after year with even bigger harvests than the year before.

"The first year we brought in 840 lbs.," said Jay Sinnes, master gardener. "The second year yielded 2,420 lbs;



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the third 4,270; and last year 5,020 1lbs."

The project required more than just dirt. They installed an 8-foot fence to keep out the deer and poultry wire to keep out the rabbits. Raised beds were constructed and filled with mushroom compost, sandy loam topsoil and gypsum. Irrigation was installed, but one year when the pond went dry, they hauled water and found a storage tank.

"We've always thought of it as a project to do the best we could do—to do as much good as (we) could until it was no longer of value," Sinnes said.

Teaching others, serving those in need

At first, it was more of an educational project. Greenerydeprived folks could have a plot to putter with their tomatoes. Retired members could take up a hobby. Families could get dirty together. Master gardeners could teach classes. The local 4-H could grow vegetables to enter in contests at the county fair. Last year, one of their eggplants won.

The teaching aid evolved from being about agriculture to being about feeding the hungry. The real harvest was providing fresh food for Bartlesville neighbors who relied on homeless shelters, food banks and once-a-week dinners to take care of their appetites. Little did the volunteer gardeners know they would be feeding hungry diners with food that sparked so many fond childhood memories-especially about vegetables like kohlrabi, chard and potatoes for soup.

Often, it was children and youth who made all the sweating and sore backs worthwhile. Everyone agreed it was important schoolchildren receive a visual and hands-on experience.

Connie Ellis said many kids were flabbergasted to learn where carrots come from, even though the kids ate them in their lettuce salads.

Although she still won't claim to have a green thumb herself, Ellis has found a way to grow through her new know -how.

"Once you're out there smelling the dirt and feeling the sun on your face, you feel God's presence," Ellis said. "And when you see the looks on faces of people you are helping to feed, you realize it is you who has received the true gift."
