I write this to you in a state of utter confusion: *how is it December already?!* Nothing about this year has felt normal, so I guess I shouldn't be surprised that time doesn't make sense. It seems at the same time too soon for December and like this year has been 5 years long.

Yet here we are, in the last month of this crazy year.

The "strangeness of time" seems fitting for this time of year, as we begin Advent and prepare ourselves for the "now but not yet" coming of Christ. Advent is a time when we prepare ourselves for something that both has already happened, and is yet to come. It calls attention to the reality that "Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again" (from our Holy Communion liturgy).

For Advent, we are doing a series called *Those Who Dream*, by the organization Sanctified Art. Everything about this series is beautiful and moving: the Advent wreath readings, the original poems, the Longest Night Service liturgy, the devotional... gorgeous! And at the

same time, it's challenging: it faces the realities of this year head-on. Here's an excerpt from Day 2 of the devotional:

"To begin Advent amid a pandemic and protest is a befitting point of departure for 21st century people of God. We are being reminded that to be the people of God requires an ethical posture of attentiveness, to "keep awake." (Mark 13:37) The text charges us to "keep awake" because we do not know the day or the hour when the fullness of "God with us" will be realized. To keep awake means we are being charged, in the vernacular of Black Lives Matter, to be "woke." Being woke means being aware of, enraged by, and willing to protest in solidarity with the people who are pushed to the margins of society..."

My prayer for us as we journey through Advent is that we use this time to grow deeper in our understanding of how, as the body of Christ, we are charged with being God's hands and feet in this world. That we are to actively participate in

the bringing of God's kingdom "on earth as it is in heaven."

I pray that we will each be open to the Spirit's leading. That doesn't mean we have to agree with everything that is said in the devotional or what others say, but it means we're willing to be uncomfortable and listen for the Spirit's leading and God's dreams for this world.

"As we light the Advent candle of hope, we keep awake by dreaming, by envisioning how we will live out God's promise to be with us. We expect God to be with us and meet us on the others side of this pandemic and protest. For the other side of pandemic and protest is not a return to "normal," it is living the hope of God's continuing revelation of justice." (*Those Who Dream devotional*)

We don't know the day or the hour, but we know that *Christ is coming!*

Winter Safety Awareness

The East Ohio Disaster Response Committee reminds folks that the best way to respond to hazardous weather is advance preparation. As seasons change, this is a good time to do a few simple things that can make a big difference this winter.

Practice Fire Safety & Prevention:

People will be indoors now more than ever with the colder temperatures and the continuing pandemic. So take action now to protect your home and family by having working smoke detectors in the home, conducting fire drills, change the batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, have auxiliary heating sources serviced, and never leave cooking food unattended.

Prepare Your Home’s Exterior:

Remove and cut away low-hanging and dead tree branches to prevent them falling on your home and clean your gutters to prevent snow and ice buildup. .

Prepare Home & Vehicle

Emergency Kits: Winter emergency kits should include flashlights, batteries, blankets, coats, hats, gloves, a battery-operated radio/weather radio, first-aid kit, cell phone and charger, and enough nonperishable food and water to sustain every household member for several days.

November 29 - The First Sunday in Advent

Those who dream... keep awake (hope)

Mark 13:24-37 | Isaiah 64:1-9 | Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19

Those who dream do not fall asleep to the realities of the world. God prompts us to pay attention to where God's dreams for change and new life are emerging. In Advent, we remember that God's ultimate dream is to be intimately connected to us—to come down and dwell among us. As we keep awake, we join Isaiah and the psalmist in pleading for restoration and for God to draw near.

December 6 - The Second Sunday in Advent

Those who dream... prepare the way (peace)

Mark 1:1-8 | Isaiah 40:1-11 | Psalm 85:1-2, 8-13

John the Baptist calls the crowds into the journey of repentance and transformation. Similarly, we are called to prepare the way for God's message of love and liberation to be shouted, heard, and received. Those who dream make way for righteousness and peace to kiss, for faithfulness to spring up from the ground (Ps. 85:10-11).

December 13 - The Third Sunday in Advent

Those who dream... sow joy (joy)

Luke 1:46-55 | Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11 | Psalm 126

Ultimately, dreams sow joy, even if that joy doesn't immediately spring forth. Sowing seeds into the soil always feels risky and feeble—how can something so small become something so beautiful, so big, and so nourishing? Like Mary, we are called to tend and nurture the dreams God has woven into us.

December 20 - The Fourth Sunday in Advent

Those who dream... are not alone (love)

Luke 1:26-45 | 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16 | Psalm 89:1-4, 19-26

This week, we recognize what preceded Mary's song of praise: news that was disorienting and bewildering, possibly threatening her life. Together, Mary and Elizabeth find courage and comfort in spite of their unusual circumstances. We, too, are called to carry, support, and encourage one another's dreams.

December 27 - The First Sunday after Christmas

Those who dream... will not keep silent

Luke 2:22-40 | Isaiah 61:10-62:3

God's dreams are not for us alone. Simeon and Anna could not keep silent—they witnessed Jesus' divine presence in the temple and were compelled to speak up. Like the prophet Isaiah, we will not keep silent and we will not rest until what has been sown will spring up as righteousness and peace in every nation (Is. 61:11-62:2).

This year we voted to present our Confirmation Class and all future Confirmation Classes with the book *Invitation to Commune* by Charles Roy Goff. This year there were 32 fine young people who joined the church and **Leota** presented each of them with this book.

The past two years have been the busiest years in the history of Brecksville WSCS. Our President, **Leota Hoertz**, has been more than equal to every occasion. She has been a busy gal attending all circle meetings, bazaar workshop and helping every Thursday with Kiwanis dinners. We all thank you."

Holiday Music Out of Key: When Songs Become Sad

My Christmas season starts with a quiet tradition; it's one I picked up from my mother although it was never officially passed down. It doesn't commence after devouring my last piece of Thanksgiving pie or walking through the doors of Target at midnight on Black Friday; it starts when I get out my tattered copy of the Big Book of Christmas Songs and sit down at the piano and play from *Angels We Have Heard on High* to *Silent Night* and every carol in between.

This piano book is my favorite to play; partly because I'm not all that good and most of the songs are so familiar I can fake my way through. But mostly because playing the piano soothes me and allows me to reflect on the past, present and future. Christmas songs, which are ingrained with nostalgia and memory, are especially prone to send me back to a time when our hearts truly seemed light.

'*The first noel the angels did say...*,' and I'm standing in our church one December morning. My family is spread out over two pews, singing the hymn's harmonies just a bit too loud. My overly concerned and self-aware family is cautious to never do anything that might be considered showy or obnoxious, except where a harmony line is involved.

'*Away in a manger no crib for a bed...*,' and I'm listening to the timid and slightly off pitch crooning of a child's Christmas pageant. My mother, the director of the children's choir, is sitting in front of the singers mouthing the words as a sea of charmed parents sit behind her smiling lovingly.

'*There's a song in the air! There's a star in the sky!*' and I'm surrounded by my mother and her teary eyed siblings as they sing their deceased mother's favorite Christmas song. I'm unsure of the words or why my aunts and uncles are sad, but I know the moment is important.

'*Silent night, holy night...*,' and I'm choking through the song's familiar the words at our church candle light service the year we found out my mother was sick. Fast forward a year and I'm singing with my family in a dim room around a brightly lit Christmas tree on Christmas Eve; each of us wondering how the absence of someone could be so felt so fully.

I had a hard time with Christmas songs in the year or

two after my mother died. A few notes of Judy Garland's *Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas* or Bing Crosby's *Silent Night* and I was done; a grief side-effect that hardly seemed fair because these were the songs closest to my heart.


Sometimes the only way I can conceptualize the holidays in the year or two after the death of a loved is to think of it like a film negative; everything is opposite. Happy is sad and where we're used to being filled up with the love and warmth of the holidays, we're now filled with a well of sadness that bubbles over and erupts into tears at the most unexpected and inconvenient of times.

When you're grieving, small yet tender reminders like *I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas* and *Hanukkah Oh Hanukkah* can shock you and rub you where you're already raw. As if death hasn't stolen enough from you already, it greedily takes your ability to enjoy a song you've loved for years and sadly I don't have anything constructive to offer about this other than to say, I understand.

I see you paralyzed in the middle of your shopping because '*O Holy Night*' has begun playing over the stereo. I see you crying in church because you've just turned to this morning's hymns and realized it's '*O Little Town of Bethlehem*'. I see you looking sullen at the office holiday part because '*Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree*' is playing and you used to love the song but now it makes you want to scream. I get it. Actually a lot of people get it. You aren't alone.

In the 8 years since my mother's death these songs have recovered many of their positive qualities, but catch me on the wrong day and they still have the potential to grip my heart and bring me to tears. Except years later the tears are a mix of happy and sad emotion; they are happiness with a twist. My hope is that at the very least you will someday feel this melancholy fondness (if you don't already) and as the song goes, until then you'll, "...*have to muddle through somehow.*"

Young people grew up without this classic Warner Brother's character. The cultural differences between generations may be vast, but we have more in common. People are people, no matter what year they were born.

Christmas brings up a lot of emotions for many people. Especially if we have experienced a loss. We can experience grief during the holidays because we aren't with our loved ones. We might be longing for the family we always wished for. Even reminiscing about holidays with that special person that has passed can make us feel blue. This is something we all experience, no matter how old we are.

This is especially true for LGBTQ youth during the holidays. They are frequently kicked out of their homes. With no home and no family, LGBTQ youth face depression, hopelessness and grief. According to the Trevor Project, LGBTQ youth are four times more likely than their peers to contemplate suicide. This holiday season I ask all of you to pray for the LGBTQ community, that they may find a home that is loving and accepting. To everyone feeling lonely or sad during the holidays know that there are people who love you and remember that the people at BUMC are here to support you.

I personally have experienced the loss of loved ones. This caused depression, hopelessness and grief as well. I use this experience to try and have empathy for others that feel loss. I'm sure many of you know what grief feels like. I ask you to tap into that feeling and transform it into compassion for the younger generation that is really struggling right now.
