

For years, a dedicated team of volunteers from our United Methodist Women have been volunteering at the Brookside Food Center. Each month when they deliver our donations, they also spend the day distributing food and helping at the center. Here are some things they've learned:

- ▶ The most needed foods are tuna fish, soups, canned fruit, peanut butter, cereal, mayonnaise and jelly. Basic food stuffs are best. Please check your expiration dates.
- Non-food items are very hard to come by. Items like toilet paper, soap, tooth paste, dish detergent, diapers, feminine hygiene items, and household cleaners are not covered by Ohio's food assistance programs. Note: It's helpful if the rolls of toilet paper are individually wrapped.
- FOOD CENTER teers visit the center on the third Friday of every month! If you can help, bring your donation to the collection bin in the first floor coat room.

Thank you for helping to provide emergency food services to families living in poverty in Cleveland. Put them on your

prayer and shopping list today and help the hungry eat tomorrow!



Confirmation Sunday May 15

Confirmation Sunday, occurring each spring, is a celebration in which eighth grade youth reaffirm their commitment to God and the Church. This is the same commitment that was made at their baptism. Some young people are also baptized during the confirmation ceremony. At the same time, the

parents of the confirmands and the congregation commit to nurturing the young people and raising them up to serve God in love.

The confirmation year is a time of exploration, journey, and embrace of the Christian faith as our own. Our confirmands are challenged to make a commitment to God. It is a challenge that only they can take on. It is a time in which they choose, for themselves, that God's ways are greater than the world's ways. This decision is not an end, but a beginning.



One Is Too Many; How to Help People Who Are Homeless

While the number of Americans sleeping on the streets or in shelters continues to decrease slowly, the problem isn't going away. And the answer is much more complex than providing a warm bed and a hot meal. How can the church help homeless individuals move towards self-reliance, permanent housing and independent living?

First, do your research. Contact local government agencies, charitable organizations and other churches to get an idea of what kind of help is needed. Fairwood Community United Methodist Church in Renton, Washington, specifically helps women and children through its REACH Center of Hope. Ask lots of questions. Take notes. Gather numbers. The more information you have, the better equipped you will be to make a difference.

Second, determine what is already being done. Know what help is available for people who can't pay the bills. Find out what resources are already available in your community. Collect information about the local, state and national resources (such as HUD.gov and HHS.gov), and post it throughout your church. Include numbers and information for food pantries, shelters, medical clinics, welfare agencies, social services, libraries with free computer labs or tax help, etc. The more comprehensive the list, the better equipped you will be to point people in the right direction. Make sure that everyone knows how and where to direct homeless individuals for help.

Third, <u>question your charitable policies</u> Look closely at what your church is doing or has done in the past. Should any ministries be added — or subtracted? Ask yourself:

- What, if any, needs are being unmet?
- Can the church offer a way to help that is not currently available?
- How can the church help solve the problem at hand?

Often, you will find that someone else is already tackling the problem. If that's the case, consider how members of your church can partner with existing organizations.

Arch Street United Methodist Church in Philadelphia helped people who are homeless by collaborating with the Student-Run Emergency Housing Unit of Philadelphia. Together they not only provide temporary housing, but also give student volunteers an opportunity to learn how to advocate for the needs of homeless people.

Fourth, do something Think creatively about ways that your church can help.

- Pair up with a local shelter to provide extra housing on nights when there aren't enough beds, possibly rotating with other churches or organizations.
- Encourage volunteers to help organizations who build houses for those who are homeless.
- Ask Sunday school classes or other small groups to team up with meal providers in the community.
- Take a cue from Ebenezer United Methodist Church in Stafford, Virginia. Volunteers there sign up for house-keeping duties at a local shelter.
- Donate space to organizations to host alcohol- or drugabuse support group meetings, <u>DivorceCare</u>, job fairs, ESL classes or career development seminars.
- Sponsor a large pantry-stocking Sunday where congregants bring in canned goods and other food items to help stock community pantries.
- Maintain a list of professionals within your church who are willing to donate their services to those in need.
- Remember that part of combating homelessness is helping people maintain a home. Recruit volunteers who are willing to mow lawns or help with home repairs.
- Pair volunteers with individuals who need assistance preparing resumes, finding appropriate clothing, applying for jobs and preparing for interviews.
- Provide transportation to help take people to job interviews, medical appointments, shopping trips or searches for housing, or provide public transportation coupons or tokens to help pay their way.
- Provide free pre-paid phones or phone service cards to help homeless individuals stay in contact with potential employers.

Providing assistance to homeless individuals is not about creating an opportunity for church members to feel good about themselves. It's not about putting a Band-Aid on the wound. And it doesn't necessarily mean reinventing the wheel. But one homeless person is one too many. Don't tackle the problem alone. Work together with your community and start making a difference today.
