This will be my first "normal" Easter at BUMC.

That's right: I came here in July of 2019, so my first Easter was in 2020... after COVID sent us into lockdown and changed everything. My first Maundy

Thursday and Good Friday services at BUMC were in the Parlor, in what we lovingly called "Studio 65." And on Easter Sunday, we attached my iPhone to a tripod and soundboard so we could live stream from our beautiful sanctuary. I still remember the bright sun shining in the windows as I led us in Easter worship surrounded by a garden of lilies, hydrangeas, tulips, and daffodils.

Last year, Easter was a bit more "normal," with our in-person sunrise service on the lawn. *It was a gorgeous, hope-filled morning!* Then we went inside to live stream a service that combined live liturgy and

sermon with a pre-recorded orchestra and vocalist Machala Comenschek (you know her!), directed by Malik Khalfani.

This year (fingers crossed and COVID don't rise) will be my first "normal" Easter at BUMC. Note *normal* is in quotations. Because I think we all know better than to assume it will be just like the "before times" (pre-COVID). Yes, we'll dress up in our Easter best, smell the beautiful Easter flowers, and sing the Hallelujah chorus together... just like before. *And oh my heavens, it's going to be holy and wonderful!*

And yet, I'm sure it's also going to be different than just a few years ago.

Because *<u>me're</u>* different than just a few years ago.

We've lost some people and gained some people; we live stream our services and worship with people from across the country; and COVID has helped us become more aware of the daily ways in which God brings beauty and life out of death and despair... just like on Easter.

A few weeks ago, during a sermon, I shared that caterpillars, before they transform into butterflies, turn into goo

inside their chrysalis. What I didn't mention, was that studies have shown that *butterflies remember when they were caterpillars*. Even though they have been completely deconstructed and recreated into an entirely different looking insect, they're not completely different. They bring experiences and memories into their "new life."

This Easter, for me, is a reminder that this is just one more way that we are like new butterflies. We are in

many ways a "new" church, and yet we carry with us the history and memories of an established, historical church. The task before us is to discern how we can bring the beauty of "what we've always done" and combine it with the new, life-giving things we do now.

When a butterfly emerges from their chrysalis, they struggle for what can seem like *40 years* to break free and spread their wings. But the struggle is part of the process: without it, the butterfly isn't strong enough to fly away.

That's where I think we are now: in the struggling-out-of-our-chrysalis part. We've lived through the goo of COVID, we have our memories and also the new, and now we're struggling to "emerge"—to figure out what this "new" looks like.

Ugh.

And yet... Easter is coming.

So we know God will be with us through the entire process, cheering us on, guiding us, and helping us to see *the incredible things we haven't even imagined yet*.

Easter Offering

This year our Easter offering will go to a local mission and an international mission, recognizing that our neighbors extend across the globe.

Our local mission is the *Greater Cleveland Habitat for Humanity*. For the sixth year in a row, we are again committing to be a Faith Build Partner, to build safe, healthy, affordable places to live, play and grow in the Cleveland area. The homes are sold at no profit with zero percent interest mortgages, and minimal down payments and closing costs. Approved homeowners qualify for a monthly housing payment no more than 30% of their monthly income.

As a Faith Build Partner, we commit to giving \$5,000 in 2022, as well as volunteering for four work days in the summer/fall.

Our international mission is *humanitarian relief to the people of Ukraine*. Along with our prayers for Ukraine, we know they also need our financial assistance. We will give through UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief), providing direct assistance to those in Ukraine as well as assistance to Ukrainians fleeing to neighboring countries.

Both missions speak to our value of *Determined Service*, and showing God's love for others by meeting the needs for the whole person. When you designate your giving as "Easter Offering," it will be split evenly between these two missions.

Palm Sunday—*Even The Stones Cry Out*—*April 10 at 8:30 and 10 am Kids Lead Worship* – Wave those palms, shake your tambourine and throw your cloak in the road! Kids will help us to see what all the excitement was about that day that Jesus triumphantly rode into Jerusalem on a donkey. They will be with us, leading and guiding at both services.

Maundy Thursday—Take Off Your Shoes—April 14 at 7 pm

In a room full to the brim with emotion, Jesus offers a tender, loving, and humble goodbye, stooping low to wash and caress his disciples' feet. Like the water splashing within the washbasin, his actions ripple out: "Go and do likewise. Just as I have loved you, love one another." Allow yourself to be filled to the brim so you can go out and fill others too.

Good Friday—A Cup of Sorrow—April 15 at 7 pm

On this Good Friday, we grieve the violence of humanity. In John's account of Jesus' death, Jesus' final words are: "I am thirsty. . . it is finished." He is offered a jar full of sour wine as he takes his final breaths. And yet, even here, God's love is full, poured out, self-emptied. Even in his last moments, Jesus is overflowing with truth and the fullness of the human experience. God embodies the fullness of pain and deep sorrow. And so, in the silence of this day, let us, too, sit in the fullness of this cup of sorrow.

Easter Sunday—*An Expansive Life*—*April 17 at 7, 8:30 and 10 am* How do we carry forth what we have learned this Lent? Can we be curious enough to return and remember? Can we allow ourselves to be filled with expansive hope? Can we trust in the expansive promise of new life, and carry that promise with us wherever we go?

7 am Easter Sunrise Service—Come as you are and dress for the weather! Join us on the church lawn as we greet the rising sun and celebrate our risen Lord!

8:30 am Easter Service—The Sanctuary will fill with songs of celebration from the choir, brass and strings. The Wiggle Room is open from 8 am until 11 this Sunday.

10 am Easter Service—The Worship Band leads us in songs of hallelujah! We will have our Children's Moment and Sprouts, but no Education hour.

Meet the Sunday Morning Task Force

On March 1, our Sunday Morning Task Force met for the first time. We centered ourselves for the task ahead, and acknowledged the importance of balancing our current needs and wants with creating space for those who are not yet here.

The majority of our time was spent sharing our personal definitions of *honest worship*. The Vision Team defined honest worship as *"inviting everyone to participate in worship authentically and holistically: heart, mind, soul, and body."* That value is demonstrated by

- Coming as you are, in the messiness of life to wrestle with the questions of faith.
- Encountering God through different forms of worship opportunities.
- Encouraging everyone to contribute in our worship.

And yet, we know that *honest worship* means something different to each of us. Listening to each person share their definition of *honest worship* was nothing short of a holy moment: to hear the importance of worship and this faith community to peoples' faith journeys; how being welcomed as their authentic selves helped them feel unconditionally loved by God; and how having space to ask the big questions of faith together gave them hope.

Then we turned to listing all the many things we must consider when planning a Sunday morning schedule. What a long and somewhat overwhelming list! We recognized with deeper significance how challenging it will be to create something that will suit the needs and desires of most (we know we're not going to be able to please all!) And yet, by grounding ourselves in our value of *honest worship*, we felt up to the task... with God's guidance.

We will meet again at the beginning of April to talk through the results of the survey we all took in March and begin brainstorming. I ask that you pray for our team members individually and as a group: for God's wisdom and discernment in the weeks to come.

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Easter Flower Trivia

- A gift of a bunch of daffodils is said to ensure happiness for the receiver. As early spring bloomers, daffodils represent the arrival of new life. In England, they're known as "Lent lilies" because they've long been associated with Lent.
- Did you ever wonder how Easter lilies got their name? Their trumpet shape is said to be symbolic of a trumpet sounding the message that Jesus has risen and their white color the purity of Christ.
- **Tulips** also remind us of rebirth, as they're among the first flowers to emerge from winter dormancy. They are said to represent love, belief and forgiveness. Their shape and vibrant colors resemble an Easter egg, too.
- As an Easter gift, hydrangeas represent gratitude and understanding, by tradition. That's a lovely gift!
- Azaleas are among the earliest spring blooming shrubs—and the only plant on this list that is not a bulb. For Easter, they are symbols of temperance, moderation and love.

About the smell... Many people are sensitive to strong scents. Several years ago, we stopped including the very fragrant hyacinth in our Easter Flower display, and we remove the stamens from our lilies to reduce their scent. Our aim is to always be a safe space for those with sensory sensitivity!

The Mission Committee challenged us to raise \$1000, with the promise that they would match that amount, dollar for dollar. YOU DELIVERED! Another matching donor stepped up, and *we raised a total of \$4341 in support of Nehemiah Mission!*

These funds will help with immediate needs, including upgrades to the sanctuary and new parlor space, garden cleanup and build, and community outreach.

What's Nehemiah Mission, and what in the world is going on

there? In March two groups from our church attended breakfast presentations there to find out! We learned that this dynamic outreach program, housed in one of Cleveland's near-downtown, multi-ethnic neighborhoods (at the corner of W65th and Bridge) has been reaching out into all corners of Cleveland since 2004.

We learned about the history of the mission from Jan Yandell, one of its founders, then learned about its present and future from current Programming Executive Director, Alison Klockner and Missions Programming Director, Blair Porter. In her talk, Blair Porter reminded us that God is in the midst of all of the work through Nehemiah Mission. We are not bringing God to Cleveland. God is already here.

Nehemiah Mission is a community center where Christ is felt and all are welcome. Afterschool programs are held for kids attending the school next door, weekly "Bread on Bridge" meals are served for the community, and an African church congregation worships in their sanctuary on Sundays. Sewing classes, a mother's group, and book clubs are offered and Nehemiah's community garden feeds the neighborhood. A fledgling 4H Club will soon teach kids about raising chickens and rabbits. God is in the midst of all of it!

From October through March of this year, Nehemiah Mission provided temporary housing for Afghan and African Refugees. These newcomers to Cleveland live on-site at the Mission until permanent housing can be secured by US Together, a Cleveland based refugee resettlement agency. Nehemiah Mission continues to support these families as they transition into life in the United States.

Nehemiah Mission is committed to works which are transformational, not transactional. Lois Arnold, founder of A Life Of Hope Outreach and a resident of the community, is working with Nehemiah to get resources directly to those without shelter, food, and clothing. Other partner organizations include The City Mission, Laura's Home, Habitat for Humanity, and Trials for Hope. By joining forces and combining resources God's work will be multiplied.

This summer proves to be a productive one, with church mission teams committing to week-long projects like completing minor home repairs, painting, yard work, and feeding and distributing supplies to those experiencing homelessness. Teams also work with Nehemiah Mission Youth Group - tutoring, mentoring, and running activities for the kids. There are only a few dates left!

We encourage you to enter this Mission Field as a group, an individual, or a family...to be the hands and feet that make a difference... to provide opportunities to be in *Determined Service together*. 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Finance Recap

We ended 2021 within 1% of our goal! It is evident that you continue to keep BUMC in your hearts and minds since 93% of our revenue comes from our congregation! We were very fortunate to have a surplus amount from 2020 that we utilized in 2021 for 2% of our budget. Other revenue comes in throughout the year from renting our facilities to various groups in our community, Corporate Gift Matching, any Loose Offerings received during services and Interest Income we make on our financial accounts.



It took us \$591,800 to operate the church in 2021 (that's a big budget!). 66% of those dollars pay for the Staff. This amount includes salaries paid, as well medical insurance, worker's compensation, pension and continuing education. 9% of our budget went to maintaining our building and parsonage inside and out, while 13% paid our Conference and District Apportionments. 3% was allocated to our Missions Committee and 9% paid for our Church Administration and Programs including Music, Education, and Youth.



Looking ahead in 2022

Our pledges are UP! We have 132 pledges in for this year, which is 12 more than we received last year. 27 of these are new pledges. WOW! You also gave 56 pledges to the Planned Expense Fund and 1 pledge to the Missions Committee. The Finance Committee is excited to see all that our church will accomplish in 2022 with these funds!
