The eighth grade year is not only an important year in school, as students finish middle school and prepare for high school, but it is an important year for life in the church. A family had gone to the movie, and on the way in the young man of the family stopped at the refreshment stand to pick up some popcorn. By the time he got into the theater the lights were already dim. He scanned the theater and evidently couldn't find his family. He paced up and down the aisles searching the crowd in the near darkness. As the lights began to go down even further he stopped and asked out loud, "Does anyone here recognize me?"

We head into our summer hours here at the church, and all of us look forward to a time of ease and play. We look forward to the kids being home from school, watching plans made during the winter months pan out in family fun times of vacation, watering the garden, watching the grass grow. The songwriter had it right when he described the summer days as "lazy and hazy." Summer is a rejuvenating time.



AED for BUMC!

Our AED (Automated External Defibrillator) is installed and ready for emergencies. On May 17, Brecksville Fireman, Mike Packard, came to the church and presented a training class on the device. The biggest lesson? ANYONE CAN USE AN AED. You don't need special training, the device talks to you and tells you just what to do.

Our AED is located on the wall near the front door of the church.

An AED is used in conjunction with CPR and greatly enhances the survival rate for those suffering from arrhythmic heart conditions.

We are planning a four hour CPR certification class here at the church this summer, and would like to get an idea of how many folks would be interested in the training. The only cost would be \$3, which would be charged only if you would like an official card from The Red Cross.

BUMC Youth in Mission

On Sunday, June 10, just after the school year ends, 17 classmates and I will fly to Little Rock, Arkansas to work as volunteers on the Heifer Ranch in nearby Perryville. The Heifer Ranch is one of Heifer International's global

learning centers. Heifer International is a worldwide group whose mission is to help communities end hunger and poverty and to care for the earth, and to teach the idea that one person can make a difference. Heifer International first started almost 70 years ago when a church mission relief worker from the mid-west named Dan West was handing out rations of milk to hungry children during the Spanish Civil War. After West returned home he dedicated himself to ending hunger permanently by providing families with livestock and training so that they could learn to feed themselves without having to depend on others for food. In 1947, 17 heifers left New York for Puerto Rico and from that Heifer International was born, with the simple idea that giving families a source of food rather than short-term relief is the better way. In return the recipients promise to pass on the offspring of the animal they receive to someone else in need. Heifer International has helped more than 65 million people help themselves.

The Heifer Ranch in Perryville is Heifer International's oldest and largest learning center. While there, we will get a first hand look at the challenges surrounding hunger and poverty. Heifer Ranch is also a farm and has animals like water buffalo, camels, goats, pigs, and, of course, heifers. We will help take care of the animals and crops, help with upkeep of the ranch, and make building bricks for people who cannot afford to buy them. One night we will stay in one of Heifer's global villages to experience what it is like to live with hunger and in poverty. My classmates and I will be at the Ranch for five days, returning home on June 15. Our Sunday school classes have supported Heifer International's work for some time. It will be good to get a first hand look at what all has been and can be accomplished with donations. I will report back again when I get home about what all I learned. - *Alec Wilson, Grade 8, Old Trail School*



Summer Book Group Returns!


Join us on the deck for summer sunshine, tasty food, and lively discussion!


Sunday, July 8: *Night* by Elie Wiesel, Jewish-American writer, professor, activist, Nobel Laureate, and Holocaust survivor Book Cost: \$9.95, when purchased through the church, or consider the Kindle edition* for \$9.99.

Night is Elie Wiesel's masterpiece, a candid, horrific, and deeply poignant autobiographical account of his survival as a teenager in the Nazi death camps. This new translation by Marion Wiesel, Elie's wife and frequent translator, presents this seminal memoir in the language and spirit truest to the author's original intent. And in a substantive new preface, Elie reflects on the enduring importance of *Night* and his lifelong, passionate dedication to ensuring that the world never forgets man's capacity for inhumanity to man.



Sunday, July 29: *Bad Religion* by Ross Douthat, American author, blogger and New York Times columnist. Book Cost: \$14.41, when purchased through the church, or consider the Kindle edition* for \$12.99.

Bad Religion offers a masterful and hard-hitting account of how American Christianity has gone off the rails—and why it threatens to take American society with it. Writing for an era dominated by recession, gridlock, and fears of American decline, Douthat exposes the spiritual roots of the nation's political and economic crises. He argues that America's problem isn't too much religion, nor is it an intolerant secularism. Rather, it's *bad religion*: the slow-motion collapse of traditional faith and the rise of a variety of pseudo-Christianities that stroke our egos, indulge our follies, and encourage our worst impulses. Douthat's urgent call for a revival of traditional Christianity is sure to generate controversy, and it will be vital reading for all those concerned about the imperiled American future.



Sunday, August 26: *Jesus, the Bible, and Homosexuality*, by Jack Rogers, Professor of Theology Emeritus, San Francisco Theological Seminary. Book Cost: \$11.56, when purchased through the church, or consider the Kindle edition* for \$9.49.

In this best seller, evangelical theologian and former Moderator of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Jack Rogers makes a biblical case for equal rights for people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender (LGBT). The book describes Rogers' own change of mind and heart on the issue, argues for a Christ-centered reading of Scripture, debunks stereotypes about people who are LGBT, and presents ideas for how the church can heal itself and move forward again. A fascinating combination of personal narrative, theology, and church history, this book is essential reading for all concerned with the future of the church and the health of the nation.

During our Lenten Study, one class focused on the needs of Native Americans in our local community.

As a result, our church is developing a continuing partnership with the Native American community in Cleveland through the American Indian Education Center (AIEC) on Brookpark Road.


In addition to distributing food, school supplies, and clothing from their limited resources, the Center offers cultural education to the Indian children to assist in preserving their heritage. Children gather there on Thursdays after school. Unfortunately, the Center's budget does not allow them to provide a healthy supper, which the children commuting a longer distance right after school would miss. Some of the low income families do not even have the option of a healthy evening meal. **We can help!**

We are building a rotating calendar for volunteers to provide these meals to the children at the Center every Thursday afternoon. The first volunteer meal was served on May 17, consisting of spaghetti and meat balls, tossed salad, and a dessert provided separately by the Women's Emmaus group.

Can you help with this service opportunity? You may want to provide the meal or a portion of the meal. You may decide that you would like to fund a meal but wouldn't have the time to deliver it. In that case, restaurant gift cards are very useful - particularly if *you* can get a discount at the gas pump for some purchases. 'Tis the season — for meetings

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — With General Conference 2012 in the rearview mirror, the focus moves to a virtual traffic jam of regional and jurisdictional meetings ranging from consolidating three annual conferences to electing more than a dozen new bishops. In the U.S., Annual (regional) Conferences began May 17 in Detroit and continue through June 24 in Roanoke, Va. In July, jurisdictional conferences will meet to elect and assign new bishops. Peace with Justice Sunday

WASHINGTON — United Methodist congregational resources are available to celebrate Peace with Justice Sunday, traditionally observed the first Sunday after Pentecost (May 27 this year), which this year will be June 3. Half of the special offering helps in advocating for peace around the world and the other half supports justice ministries in annual (regional) conferences.

Trucking out sweet potatoes

BIG ISLAND, VA — About 30 truckloads of sweet potatoes donated by a North Carolina grower have been delivered to points around the country, but more donations are needed to roll out the 36-plus additional truckloads that have been scheduled. Each truck carries 42,000 pounds of food to its destination for \$1,000 to \$2,500, depending on distance. That translates to only 2.5 cents to 6 cents per pound. Running for Change

BAGUIO CITY, Philippines — Baguio City First United Methodist Church will kick off this weekend's annual Change the World campaign with a run. Actually, three runs — 3K, 5K and 10K. Enterprising artists also put together T-shirts, stickers and other souvenirs to tout both the fundraising runs and the campaign itself. Change the World 2012, which urges United Methodist congregations to make a difference locally and globally, is May 19-20. It is a program of the denomination's Rethink Church campaign.

New bishops' president a pioneer

TAMPA, Fla. — When she was a teenager, Bishop Rosemarie Wenner was the only one in her confirmation class in the United Methodist church she attended in Germany. When she began considering going into ministry, there was only one female United Methodist pastor in her country. And, when she was elected bishop of Germany, she became the first woman outside the United States tapped for a United Methodist episcopacy. Now, she is the new president of the denomination's Council of Bishops.

Opening for women's advocate

WASHINGTON — The United Methodist Board of Church and Society is seeking a director and organizer for women's advocacy. The opening is part of the board's Louise and Hugh Moore Population Project, whose mission is to work with and on behalf of women around the globe, particularly those most marginalized, by advocating for the passage of just policies by the U.S. Congress and the United Nations.
