
Dr. Hugh McKean of Chiengmai, Thailand, tells of a church of four hundred members where every member tithes. They receive a weekly wage of forty stangs (less than twenty cents) and their rice. Of this meager existence, each gives a tenth every week. Because of this, they have done more for Christ in Thailand than perhaps any other church. They pay their own preacher and have sent two missionary families to spread the gospel in a community cut off from the outside world. They are keenly interested in all forms of Christian work, especially work for unfortunates of every kind; and their gifts for this kind of work are large. They have not only accepted Christ, but, having found Him good, they are making Him known to others. Oh, by the way, this church of all tithers is also a church of all lepers—every person has leprosy.

We come to November, a month that holds much celebration for us. We will engage in our all church stewardship campaign, culminating with a special Commitment Sunday. Then we move into Thanksgiving and the beginning of our Advent and Christmas celebrations. We have so much for which to be thankful. It has always been my experience that those who have little seem to be able to share just about everything that they have. November 17 – Leadership Sunday



NOVEMBER 10 ORGAN AND TISSUE DONOR AWARENESS SUNDAY

"Jesus died for us so that, whether we are awake or asleep, we will live together with him. So continue encouraging each other and building each other up, just like you are already doing." — 1 Thessalonians 5:10-11, Common English Bible

When United Methodist pastor the Rev. David Lord's pager went off after church on Mother's Day, he and his wife Kathryn assumed a parishioner wanted to talk to him. When he took the call, however, what he learned was far worse.

His son, Ray, 21, had been in a car accident. Tragically, Ray was declared brain dead soon afterward. As the young man's parents processed the news, they asked about organ donation.

Ray Lord died shortly before midnight on that Mother's Day, but doctors harvested his organs so others would have a chance to live.

"As we were leaving the hospital," Kathryn Lord said, "I couldn't help but think about Ray's reply any time he was asked how he was doing. He always said, 'My heart's still beating.' That night as I walked out of his room, his heart was beating only because he was on life support until his organs and tissues could be recovered."

Although David and Kathryn Lord lost their son, others gained life — or a better quality of life because because of the gift the Longs gave in their tragedy.

Today, United Methodists observe Organ and Tissue Donor Sunday, celebrating and thanking God for the gift of life and encouraging people to consider organ and tissue donation.

On Organ and Tissue Donor Sunday, let us remember the gift of donors. Each day, about 77 people receive organ transplants, and 18 people die waiting for them. People of all ages and conditions can be organ donors.

"I would not want anyone to go through what we did with Ray," said Kathryn Lord after her son, 21, died tragically and his parents donated his organs. "However, I would like to be able to educate others on the facts about organ and tissue donation. Please don't be afraid to talk about it. You never know when you may be faced with having to make a life-giving decision."

The week after Ray died, Kathryn said, "I could not help but wonder if we should have kept Ray on life support longer. Then we got our first letter from Tennessee Donor Services, and in that letter was 'To Remember Me' by Robert N. Test. After reading the letter and the poem, I knew we had done the right thing." --Adapted from dcids.org and womenshealth.gov

Any age is the right age to share the gift of life! 100 million Americans are registered organ, eye and tissue donors. Many are in their 50s, 60s, 70s and beyond. More than 114,000 people of all ages are waiting for a donor. Go to organdonor.gov to learn more!

Nicole Keller is an active solo and chamber music recitalist and clinician in the United States and abroad. She enjoys exploring all aspects of organ repertoire, especially pairing new music for the instrument with the staples of the repertoire. Recent solo performances include concerts in New York, St. Louis, Kansas, Germany, France, and Kazakhstan. Ms. Keller performs regularly as a solo and collaborative artist on the organ, piano and harpsichord. She is on faculty at the Baldwin Wallace University Conservatory of Music in Berea, OH and serves as the Director of Music at The Community of Saint John in Hudson, OH.

In August of 2010 Ms. Keller was an instructor in the Internationale Or-

gelakademie at Dom St. Stephan in Passau, Germany. The course focused on American and English organ music and included students from several countries in Europe. In conjunction with the course, she played a recital at Dom St. Stephan and at Stadtkirche St. Peter und Paul in Waldkirchen with Dr. Horst Buchholz, Director of Music at the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis. In April of 2011 Ms. Keller won first prize in the North American round of the Michael Tariverdiev International Organ Competition, earning a place in the sec-



ond round in Kaliningrad, Russia. In Kaliningrad she was awarded the Special Shabyt Prize from the Kazakh National University of Arts in Astana, Kazakhstan for "the most promising organist for inspiration and luck" and performed a recital in Astana in May of 2012.

Ms. Keller received the Performer's Certificate and the Master of Music Degree in Organ Performance and Literature at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York under the tutelage of David Higgs. While at Eastman, she studied continuo with Arthur Haas and improvisation with Dr. Gerre Hancock. She received the Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance from the Baldwin Wallace Conservatory of Music in Berea, Ohio, studying piano with George Cherry and Jean Stell and organ with Margaret Scharf.

Saturday, November 16, at 7:30pm in the Sanctuary Program to include works by Buxtehude, Mendelssohn, Vierne, and Messiaen.

This concert is free and open to the public. All are welcome!

Also coming up... Brecksville Community Chorus & Youth Chorus Sunday, December 8, at 4:00pm in the Sanctuary Concert includes Daniel Pinkham's Christmas Cantata with brass quartet and organ!

Churches 'star' in movies, TV shows PLANO, III. — The picturesque structures of United Methodist churches have been featured in dozens of films including such notable ones as "The Graduate," "Back to the Future," "Home Alone" and "The Godfather." Three United Methodist churches were featured in three movies and a television show that premiered in 2013. `Mother church' of U.S. Methodism reborn FREDERICA, Del. — Barratt's Chapel, which dates to 1780 and is the oldest existing Methodist house of worship in America, is showing new signs of life. The first regular worship services in decades occurred there this summer. Attendance grew during the 10 weeks, persuading Peninsula-Delaware Annual (regional) Conference officials to commit to a repeat next year, with a season twice as long. The nearly square, brick structure of about 2,100 square feet was the scene of the first meeting between Methodism pioneers Francis Asbury and Thomas Coke.
