### **Creating safe spaces to grow with God and one another.**

Warning: this is going to be another “pastor’s newsletter article about change.” But before you start praying, “Lord, have mercy on us!”—hear me out.

One of the things I learned in seminary was about “church size cultures.” It was interesting to me, but honestly, I never thought it’d be anything to share with the greater congregation. However, as I’m seeing our church grow, I think this bit of “seminary knowledge” would be helpful in understanding what we’re currently living through at Brecksville UMC. So here it goes...

Church Size Cultures 101:

Did you know that a large church isn’t just a small church with more people? It’s true. Because of the relational dynamics of ministry, the culture of a church changes as the number of people changes.

In small churches (40-200), there’s a pastor and the congregation. Decisions are made by lay leaders, who oversee the pastor (and staff, if there is any), who then does the ministry. Everyone knows everyone else and they act like one big (happy?) family, with the pastor acting as a shepherd.

In medium-size churches (200-400), there’s a pastor, staff, and the congregation. As the congregation grows larger, so does the staff, in order to meet the diverse needs of the congregation. There are too many people for everyone to know everyone else, so relationships are built through intentional gatherings of small groups (classes, mission opportunities, coffee hour, etc.).

Decisions are made by boards and committees, in conjunction with the pastor. As the congregation grows,

the laity begin to take more and more of an active role in ministry, in partnership with the staff, who is then tasked with leading church programs. As the church grows, the pastor becomes more of a “rancher,” training, organizing, and supporting laity and staff for ministry.

In large churches (400-800), again there’s pastors, staff, and the congregation. As the congregation grows, the staff members become more specialized in what they do, as do the pastors. Decisions are made by the pastor, staff, and lay leadership, who focus on the “balcony view” of the entire church—how the church is working together to live out its vision. The staff’s roles change from leading church programs to empowering laity to lead programs. So, what does this mean for BUMC?

In the spring of 2019, Brecksville UMC was consistently worshipping at about 150-200 people. By January 2020, we were consistently hitting over that 200 mark. Then COVID hit, and we had no idea what would happen when we returned. However, we’ve been pleasantly surprised that since returning to in-person worship in May 2021, we have been worshipping with about 300-350 individuals each week.

Yay us!

There are many reasons for the growth we’ve seen in the past couple of years, and we definitely need to celebrate that (Woot!)! With this article, though, I want to focus on what this growth means to our faith community.

In three years, we’ve gone from a small-church culture to a (larger) medium-church culture. While also going

through other changes due to COVID, life, etc. This growth has changed us in a variety of ways, and we're not done growing! We've gone from knowing everyone and working as one big family, to getting to know one another (again or for the first time) through intentional small groups.

The first thing this growth means is that we can't expect to know everyone at worship or in a small group. We have to be willing to go up to someone and say, "Hi, my name is \_\_\_ it's good to see you here!" and begin a conversation, setting aside the fear that the person will be offended if we don't recognize them because they've been at Brecksville UMC for decades. (We also need to not get offended if this happens to us!)

The second thing this growth means is that the staff's roles are changing. It used to be that people would have ideas, give them to the staff, and the staff's job was to make things happen; then people would come and support the ministries. Now, though, we have so many ministries and programs that we're doing (or want to do!), that we need leaders to step up and lead with us. The staff's job is now to empower laity to lead ministries and programs, rather than leading them. 'Cuz let's be real: if we expect staff to lead everything our church does, we will drastically limit our church's abilities. This leads to the third thing...

This growth means that we need YOU to own this church! I don't mean "own" in a "don't touch my stuff" kind of way, but in a "I love and care about this place, so I want to help" kind of way. Remember that **YOU are Somebody** sermon I preached a few months ago? Yeah... that.

Finally, this growth means that we need to take a look at how we govern our church, and make sure we're not getting bogged down in meetings and discussions about ministry, but rather are creating space to do ministry. You'll hear more about this soon!

This church is growing because it's a spectacularly amazing group of individuals who are focused on 2 things: loving God & loving each other. And this church will only continue to grow if we each step out in faith, make a commitment of our time and energy, and use the gifts God has given us to help this church family flourish.

We (as a staff and leadership) are committed to helping you discover your spiritual gifts and how you can best use them both within the church and in daily life. Inside this newsletter are opportunities to uncover your spiritual gifts, get to know each other in a variety of small group gatherings, and ways you can be somebody at Brecksville UMC!

# WHAT'S OUR Sunday Morning "Why?"

When we came back to in-person worship in 2021, we came back to new worship times. We had known for a while that our old worship schedule (8:45 & 11:15) wasn't working as well as it did when it was first set. So, we put out a survey and asked people to share their thoughts and preferences. Out of that survey came our current worship schedule (8:30 & 10:00). We gave it a solid try, and this spring we put out another survey to ask: what's working well? What's not? How can it be tweaked?

I created a Task Force to consider these questions and discern the best Sunday morning schedule for Brecksville UMC. This Task Force has people from both types of worship services, as well as those who are "seasoned" BUMC-ers, and those who are newer to our community. We've met several times since March, pouring over the survey results, having honest conversation, and praying.

As we met, we realized we wouldn't find a schedule that suited everyone's preferences—that's just not possible. We also recognized that while Sunday mornings are very important to the life of our church, they're not everything. Our services are available online throughout the week (and we have people who regularly worship through them in-between Sundays!); we have classes and other opportunities for adults to grow throughout the week; and we utilize at-home resources for children and families.

So, our focus became: ***"What is our Sunday morning 'why?'"***

We came to appreciate that Sunday mornings are really about relationships. It's the time when the largest group of our church family gathers, so it provides a unique opportunity to grow our bond with God and one another.

*Sunday mornings are to create space to encounter God and cultivate relationships with one another.*

In order to do this well, we are changing our Sunday morning schedule. Beginning on September 18, our new schedule will be: **8:30 Worship, 9:30 Joyful Gathering, 10:30 Worship**

Our 8:30 worship is what I've come to describe as our "signature service." For part of the year, this is our outdoor service; for the remainder of the year, this is a different sort of service we're still working on. We know it will have a few consistent elements (like weekly celebration of Holy Communion) but we would love collaboration on what this service could be! This service will be 45 minutes long, enabling people to grab coffee and conversation before heading to class, if they so wish.

## **New Sunday Morning Schedule Begins September 18:**

8:30 Worship

9:30 Joyful Gathering

10:30 Worship

Our 9:30 hour will be a time of *Joyful Gathering*, including coffee hour, informal conversations based on the week's scripture and podcasts, and traditional Sunday School classes for children and adults. Classes will begin promptly at 9:30 and conclude by 10:20 so that those who are attending the 10:30 service can get to worship.

Our 10:30 worship will be very similar to our current 10:00 worship service, with the worship band leading many of the songs, Children's Moment, and Sprouts. We are also adding the choir to this service to compliment the band and highlight the many beautiful voices in our church.

We know this Sunday morning schedule isn't perfect. Our prayer is that it will enable us to intentionally create space to encounter God and cultivate relationships with one another, so that we can be empowered throughout the rest of our week!

### What is Confirmation at Brecksville UMC?

It's an opportunity for students to have a personal exploration of what it means to be a Christian, and more specifically, a United Methodist. We learn about scripture, church history, prayer, spiritual development, theology, mission, and the structural connections of the UMC.

This learning takes place during our Sunday morning education hour (9:30 on Sunday mornings, beginning September 18), with their mentors, during worship, on retreat, and in many other avenues throughout the two-year process.

The confirmation journey ends with students deciding to claim their faith as their own and become full members of the United Methodist Church (or not!) Confirmation is a continuation of baptismal vows that parents make for their children as babies. Students can now say for themselves, "yes, I want to follow Jesus and I choose to be a United Methodist."

Our hope at Brecksville UMC is that Confirmation can be a safe space for students to grow with God and one another. A place to ask questions, follow their curiosity, and find a place in the world (and the church) where they feel they can totally be themselves.

### **Sunday Morning Classes for Kids**

Our children will gather in their classrooms with loving teachers who are excited to share messages of wonderful news about God. We choose one character out of the Bible each week, we learn about him or her, and how God showed God's-self to that person. We have great conversation and we make a little paper craft. Folks who have not been part of Sprouts wonder why we bother with these old fashioned paper folding crafts... well, it's

because this is the time that some really great questions are asked and discussed. We have a big range of ages in Sprouts, from preschoolers to 6th graders (and up). Often once a child 'ages-out' they continue to attend and be a pair of helping hands. And they continue to ask good questions. The younger children learn that it is never wrong to wonder and ask 'why?' in this church, it is encouraged and seen as the only way we can actually grow in our relationship with God. Plan to have your child attend Sprouts this fall. My guess is, they will love it!

**Missing a Sunday?** Your family does not need to miss all that Sunday school offered. Jenny will check in via Facebook Live around 11:30 on Sunday mornings with a summary of what we did and questions or activities you can do as a family to continue your growth in your faith. It will be available for you any time during the week.

One of the wonderful traditions in this church is Third Grade Bible Sunday, when third graders receive their very own Bibles to take home and use and learn how God is still speaking to them through the scriptures. 




## A new year begins, with a new name!

## “What is Disaffiliation?”

You may have heard about two large United Methodist churches in Texas choosing to disaffiliate from The United Methodist Church. And as The United Methodist Church continues to “splinter,” with some churches choosing to disaffiliate (leave) and others choosing to stay, we will continue to hear of these happenings.



*The EOC includes 10 districts. We are in the North Coast District.*

Disaffiliation is a process that some churches are choosing to explore and work through if they feel their beliefs no longer fit into the “big tent” of United Methodism. These churches are on the “extremes” of either end of the conservative/progressive spectrum, particularly in regards to LGBTQ+ inclusion and how it relates to biblical interpretation. I can confidently say that this congregation is somewhere in the “middle.” So, disaffiliation is not something with which we at BUMC need to concern ourselves at this time.

There is a basic disaffiliation process set out in The United Methodist Book of Discipline, and then each Annual Conference can choose to add stipulations to that. Our Annual Conference has not added any stipulations, and our Bishop and Cabinet have set out a clear process for disaffiliation discernment and shared it with pastors and churches. (It can be found on our Conference website: <https://www.eocumc.com/disaffiliation/index.html>.) Our Conference has also trained a group of individuals to prayerfully lead churches through this discernment process. The process is not necessarily “easy” (disaffiliation is a weighty decision to make and should not be done lightly), but it's also not unnecessarily difficult.

There were 11 churches in our Conference who went through the proper steps for disaffiliation prior to voting at this year's Annual Conference. There will possibly be a similar number of churches who disaffiliate in 2023. This is out of over 600 churches in the East Ohio Conference. I encourage you to pray for the churches who have chosen to disaffiliate from The UMC, as well as those who are currently in the process of discernment.

I'm happy to talk with anyone who has questions about what is going on in the greater Church, or what any of this might mean for BUMC. My intention is never to “hide” anything, but I also don't want to alarm people. While we are affected by the greater UMC, the postponement of General Conference to 2024 means any major decisions are years in the future. I encourage us to keep our current focus on how God is calling us to live out our mission of **creating safe spaces to grow with God and one another.** - *Rev. Heidi Welch, Senior Pastor*

The 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is confidential, free, and available 24/7/365, connecting those experiencing a mental health, substance use, or suicidal crisis with trained crisis counselors.

Moving to an easy-to-remember, 3-digit number will provide greater access to life-saving services.

On July 16, 2022, the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (1-800-273-8255) transitioned to the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. Ohioans who are experiencing a mental health or addiction crisis, and their family members, will be able to call, chat, or text the 988 number in order to reach a trained counselor who can offer help and support.

In 2020, the U.S. had one death by suicide every 11 minutes. Suicide is the leading cause of death for people ages 10–34. Behind each of these data points, there are people, families and communities who have been impacted.

Yet there is hope. The 988 Lifeline helps struggling people overcome suicidal crisis or mental-health related distress every day. Call or text 988 or chat at [988lifeline.org](https://988lifeline.org) for yourself or if you are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support. 988 serves as a universal entry point so that no matter where you live in the United States, you can reach a trained crisis counselor who can help.

***Say "yes" and show up.*** Not excited about attending your spouse's work party? Less than thrilled about your second cousin's baby-shower? Not sure you'll like that Bible study? Invited to an event at your child's school but feeling shy about it? Go anyway! To make friends, you need to get out of your house and go where the people are. Give yourself the opportunity to meet new friends.

***Set friendship goals.*** Do you have friends that you just don't see as often as you'd like? You might set a goal of getting together once a month. Maybe you could challenge yourself to try one of the tips in this list once a week. Pick a goal and celebrate when you reach it.
