The main difference was that there wasn't a time where worship "started" and "ended." We gathered at the beginning of the week, and acknowledged God's presence with us, and then continued to do that throughout the week—while we laughed and sang and learned as a group, journaled and hiked in solitude, ate and laughed at meals, and supported one another in our small groups.

Worship is the act of showing reverence, adoration, and devotion to God. I can't think of anywhere in the Bible where it says that worship has to be a set apart time with a beginning and an ending. Yes, it is good to set apart time in our lives to focus exclusively on God's goodness in worship. However, just as God is not confined to our sanctuary, worship need not be confined to an hour on Sunday morning (or whenever you choose to worship that week!)

We show reverence to God when we hear someone share a different political view than us (even something that doesn't make "logical sense") and we choose to see the Divine Spark within them rather than "the enemy." We show adoration to God when we see a beautiful sunrise and think, "Wow, God! Good show!" We show our devotion to The Way of God when we choose to let the person on the highway merge in front of us rather than wave our fist (or finger) and yell.

Living every moment of our life as worship means acknowledging that no matter where we are, God is within and around us, emanating from each person and plant and morsel, so that "whatever [we] have done to the least of these, [we] have done to [God]." It means letting go of our desire to control a person or situation, and rather relinquishing to the Truth that God is present and is the One with the ability to transform hearts and minds (even our own!)

And this is the way that I choose to live into our value of Honest Worship: worshiping authentically and holistically, with our heart, mind, soul, and body... today and every day.

Sunday Morning Kids' Classes

Every kid and every family is different. This year we're offering a variety of ways for children to grow in faith and learn God's stories. Choose what's best for your circumstance:

At 9:30 – Who's Who in the Bible (Holy Moly)

Come discover the amazing people of the Bible in a fun and interactive way! Each week we'll watch a short video and then dive into games, crafts, and activities that bring the story to life. Kids of all ages will get to know a Bible character—what they did, how they followed God, and how their story connects with our own lives today. Meet your teacher in Room 402.

At 10:30 we have two options. Seedlings and Sprouts.

Seedlings – A gentle, “old-school” style class perfect for younger children and anyone who enjoys a quieter setting. Children will hear Bible stories, pray together, and enjoy simple, hands-on activities at an unhurried pace. Families may choose Seedlings for children of any age.

Sprouts – A lively, rotation-style class where we explore the same Bible story for six weeks through different learning stations—science, cooking, storytelling, games, video, music, and crafts. This class is designed for older kids with more independence; children must be in 1st grade or higher to join Sprouts.

Whichever path you choose, your child will experience God's love, engage with scripture, and build lasting friendships. Seedlings & Sprouts meet following the Children's Moment at the 10:30 service. Kids can be picked up in Rooms 401 or 402 after service ends.

Kids are always welcome in our worship spaces, but The Wiggle Room is available as another option! Staffed from 8 am until noon on Sundays, it's a safe space for our little ones, infants and up. Each adult caregiver is background checked and mindful of allergies and other needs.

A Spiritual Practice and Gift of Love: Prayer Shawls Bring Comfort

My mother's prayer shawl, shared with her shortly before she died, continues to bring me comfort. Every stitch is a prayer. Its warmth a reminder that God's arms are around us. Holding my mother's prayer shawl reminds me that we don't walk our path alone. The hands who knit it created a tangible reminder of God's love. When Sandy Crist came to me to talk about ways to share the ministry with others, my heart jumped. This holy and meaningful work needs to bless as many people as possible!

What is a prayer shawl? A prayer shawl or lap blanket is a tangible symbol of comfort, care, and prayer during times of need or celebration. A small group of knitters and crocheters, called Stitch'n'Time, create prayer shawls for our congregation.

How do I request one? If you have a family member or loved one in need of a prayer shawl or lap blanket, please reach out to the church office. The shawls and lap blankets can also be given for joyous occasions, such as the birth of a baby, a wedding, or a baptism.

Can I help? Do you knit or crochet? Consider taking part in this spiritual practice. The process of making the shawl is a form of meditation and prayer. Each stitch is infused with blessings and intentions for the person who will receive it. If you don't share this talent, pray for the ministry or consider a financial donation for supplies.



Stitch'n'Time meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 10 am in the Parlor at church. Creating together fosters a sense of community and shared purpose among crafters, but you don't have to attend the meetings to be part of this ministry. Reach out to the office to be put in touch with Sandy for patterns and tips.

The Stitch'n'Time ministry connects makers with recipients, creating a ripple effect of kindness. What a blessing it is to so many. May the person who receives each shawl - and the dear one who created it - be cradled in hope, kept in joy, graced with peace, and wrapped in love! - *submitted by Melanie Smith*

In the United States, 1 in 4 women will experience intimate partner violence in their lifetime. 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men will experience severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime. 1 in 3 adolescents is a victim of some form of dating abuse from a partner.

Journey Center for Safety and Healing envisions a community where safety and well-being are achieved by empowering people to find a path toward healthy, thriving relationships.

Contemplative Practice

Sit quietly with your hands open. Imagine placing before God one act of service you've been doing lately—especially one that has begun to feel like a burden. Ask God to fill that service with joy, connection, and purpose. Then sit in silence, trusting that joy will return—maybe not all at once, but in time.

Action Step

Find one act of service this month that brings you joy and invite someone to do it with you. Whether it's visiting a neighbor, writing Care & Prayer Mail notes of encouragement, or volunteering at a local organization, do it not because you should, but because it makes you feel alive in Christ.

The United Methodist Church forms disciples of Jesus Christ who, empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, *serve joyfully*, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connections.

What does it mean to serve joyfully?

To serve joyfully is to live with the freedom that comes from knowing our worth is not in our performance but in our belonging to God. Joyful service is a resistance to despair, a response to suffering, and a rhythm of connection in a world that is both weary and longing for hope.

Jesus never served out of obligation. His service was not mechanical or strategic. It was deeply personal and joyful. He washed feet. He fed crowds. He restored dignity. He touched the untouchable. And all the while, he served with joy, not because it was easy, but because it revealed the nature of God.

The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve.

-Matthew 20:28 NRSV

What's striking is that Jesus' service was never detached from joy, even in the face of suffering. The joy was in the connection, in the freedom, in the love poured out and received. He teaches us that service is not merely an act of doing; it's an act of being fully present to another.

Many of us may feel tired or worn out. We see division, conflict, fear, and violence permeating society. The church has labored long in difficult times—through pandemics, denominational uncertainty, and community division. Yet, in the midst of it all, the vision invites us to serve joyfully—not out of pressure, but out of possibility.

Joyful service doesn't mean pretending everything is fine. It means trusting that the Spirit is still at work—even in the small, the slow, the seemingly insignificant. It's planting seeds we may never see grow. It's showing up with food, with listening ears, and with hands ready to work, not because it's glamorous, but because it's the way of Jesus.

The world often tells us to serve to prove something: our value, our virtue, our place. But joyful service is never about being the hero. It's about being part of a community - a body - where everyone offers what they have, and where grace flows both ways.

The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you,' nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you'.

-1 Corinthians 12:21

This kind of service doesn't isolate. It connects. It invites people to show up with their gifts—no matter how big or small—and to trust that their offering matters. Whether it's organizing a clothing drive, bringing a casserole to a grieving neighbor, or staying late to stack chairs, joyful service is the thread that holds the community together.

Joyful service isn't always about solving problems. It's about presence. It's about showing up, again and again, with your whole heart—even if it's tired—and trusting God to multiply the offering. - *Adapted from the Love Boldly, Serve Joyfully, Lead Courageously series by Bryan Tener at UMCDiscipleship.org*

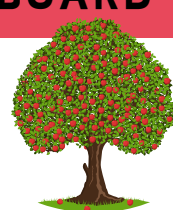

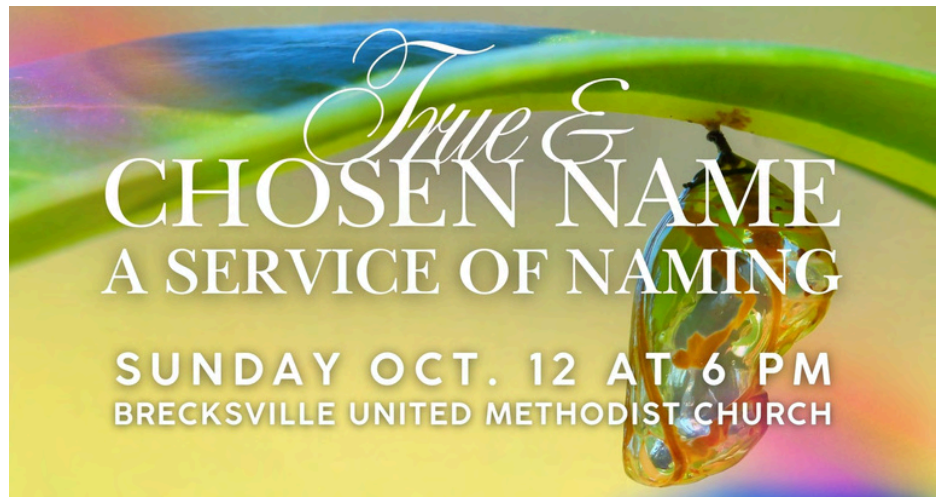


In the early 2000's, Rev. Rus Martin recognized a need at Brecksville United Methodist Church. For a quarter century, Elinor faithfully stewarded our prayer team, whose number grew from a handful of people to about 60 today. No one had a smartphone, we listened to music on CDs and TVs weren't flat.

OCTOBER MEETING

On October 2 at 9:30 am in the parlor, our very talented Brenda Calovini will be enlightening us about Social Justice and UWF. Everyone welcome!

No matter who we share the road with, intersect paths with, sit across the table from, ride the elevator with, stand in long lines with, agree with, disagree with, feel different than, look up to, frown upon... we share this in common: we are - each one - created in the image of God.

Come explore the topic of social justice with Brenda Calovini. We all carry biases as part of being human. These biases don't excuse how we perceive others but it does explain those perceptions (ones we are aware of and want to change and those that we might be completely oblivious to). Being aware of our personal biases is the first step to changing how we respond to those who deserve to be seen and treated as ones who are created in the image of God. How can we compassionately work for a more just community, near and far? In this brief talk, with way too much to cover than time allows, we will look at where we have been (women within the United Methodist Church have long been agents for good) and what we can do today to best advocate for social justice reform. To borrow a quote from UMCjustice.org, "Our faith requires it and our world needs it!" When we join with others, our efforts are magnified, our agency is fortified and we don't risk feeling so small against the enormous tide of indifference and cruelty.
