### Lent—Staying in Love with God

### Reflections from Rev. Karen Oehl

One of our adult Sunday School classes has just finished studying the three simple rules of the Christian life as outlined by John Wesley: do no harm; do good; stay in love with God. Actually, this last category was described by Wesley as "attending upon all the ordinances of God." I love Bishop Reuben Job's rephrasing of this as *staying in love with God*.

Many of you know that my husband Chris and I spend most of our weekdays apart. His work in Millersburg and Wooster make it practical for him to stay during the week in a house in Fredricksburg, a town right on the line of Wayne and Holmes counties, in the heart of Amish country. How do we handle seeing each other only on the weekends? With planning, of course. We look for ways to be together—going out to eat, going on a walk, watching a movie. We limit other weekend activities if we can. We have started to use some vacation time to go away on our own. In reality, this is probably not a bad strategy for all couples, who get separated by calendars, work, and family obligations as much as we are separated by geography. Don't we want to continue to find ways to "stay in love"?

Under "attending upon all the ordinances of God" Wesley listed these practices: worship, Bible study (both personal and communal), Communion, prayer (family and private), and fasting or abstinence. I find it interesting that these are common practices that we emphasize in the season of Lent, which we enter this week.

It is part of our shared Christian tradition to practice spiritual disciplines in Lent, but it is always a bit fuzzy as to why we should do these things. In preparation for Easter? As a time of recommitment? Because it is good for us? Just because that is what you do in Lent?

Surely the best reason for choosing to fast, spend more time with the Bible and in prayer, and being intentional about worship is to stay in love with God. Spend time with God. Make a date. Do things that you both enjoy together.

Life often separates us from God. Lent reminds us of ways to bring us closer again.

## **Confirmation;** *What everyone should know*


Confirmation classes are beginning this Sunday evening and will continue through all the Sundays of Lent. You may have noticed this on the church calendar and in the bulletin without having a clear idea of what is meant. While we share in a common Christian practice of confirmation, the preparation for this practice varies from church to church. Here is information about our program at Brecksville UMC.

The actual ritual of confirmation is held at the end of the 8<sup>th</sup> grade year. It is part of a worship service. The confirmands themselves will lead worship. Confirmation is related to baptism; it confirms the vows made at a person's baptism on their behalf. It is an opportunity for a young person to make their own profession of faith, and a time to invite the presence and power of the Spirit of God into their lives. Since it is related to the Sacrament of Baptism, the pastor should be involved not only in the ritual, but in the preparation.

Preparing for confirmation actually begins well before 8<sup>th</sup> grade, as a child participates with his or her family in worship, Sunday School, and other church activities. All of these intensify in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade year. The Sunday School curriculum in 8<sup>th</sup> grade is a Bible overview, grounding them in our faith story. Quest, a middle school after-school Bible study, allows them a chance to dig deeper into the Bible and apply it to life. Youth activities build relationships and solidify the habit of service. Unique to this year is our mentoring program, giving students the opportunity to explore faith issues one-on-one with a member of the congregation. Finally, in confirmation class, students will be challenged to understand their own profession of faith and what it means to be confirmed.

Please note that as of 2010 confirmation *will not* be a time when a person joins the church. Thus there will not be an emphasis on church history, polity, and membership responsibilities, although these things are touched on in all the preparation. In the next few years, a program for youth and young adults wishing to make their commitment to church membership will be offered instead, more fitting with the maturity and life situation of an older youth.

As you can see, it takes many church members, staff, and parents to support a successful confirmation program. Many thanks to all who are involved. Please lift up our confirmation class of 2010 in your prayers as they prepare for this important step of their lifelong journey of faith.

## Walk the Labyrinth During Lent

Every person using a labyrinth will have an individual experience, but some of the possibilities include:

Clearing of the mind	Drawing closer to God
Self-awareness	Letting go of hurts, griefs, etc.
Insight and discernment	Problem solving
Peace and joy	Healing-mind, body, and spirit
Transformation	Energizing
V////	

The easiest strategy for experiencing a labyrinth is to think of the journey in three stages:

- 1. The journey in. This is a time of letting go, releasing, purging
- 2. The center. Time should be spent in the center for letting in, receiving, illumination
- 3. The journey out. The return path can be a time of letting out into the world what has been received, or integrating and union with God, self, and othern
- and others.

Another easy outline for using a labyrinth looks like this:

*Focus.* Pause at the entrance to breath, calm your mind, acknowledge the beginning of the journey, perhaps speak a prayer or desire of your heart, a problem or pain.

Experience. Be attentive as you walk. Look, feel, think.

Exit. Notice the differences in your return journey.

*Reflect.* Once out of the labyrinth, take time to reflect on your experience, perhaps journaling or drawing to express your thoughts.

Repeat. Use a labyrinth on a regular basis.

There is a great deal of information on labyrinths available in print and online. *Walking a Sacred Path* by Lauren Artress is a helpful book. Some possible websites are lessonsforliving.com, sacredwalk.com, and the Labyrinth Society web site.

# **BUMC Recycles**



Our church has an active recycling program. We recycle glass, metal, plastic and cardboard through the City of Brecksville program and paper through the drop boxes at the Brecksville -Broadview Heights schools.

For the past several years the only containers to recycle glass, metal and plastic were located in the first floor kitchen. We have recently placed recycling containers in the second and third

floor kitchenettes, office work room and the fourth floor youth room. With the addition of these containers we hope to reduce the number of recyclable items being thrown into trash cans.

Paper recycling containers are located in staff offices. We will now have a paper recycling container in the narthex after Sunday services for bulletins and other paper that is no longer needed.

We are also exploring ways to reduce the number of Styrofoam cups we use at the church. Look for details in the next Good Word.
