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
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The Earth is the Lord's— but we live here

Comments from Rev. Karen Oehl

I grew up living in parsonages, and am still living in one now. So I get the concept of living in a space that actually belongs to someone else. The Brecksville parsonage feels like home, but I also have a sense of responsibility to it that comes from knowing that the church owns it. In turn, it has always been clear that the Trustees and other church members feel responsible for the parsonage, even though it is not their home. Someone else lives there, but they are responsible for it. They see it as a way of serving God.

Both of these dynamics are a good model for our relationship to the earth, to God's creation. We live here, and it is home, although it all belongs to God. We are responsible to care for it, including caring for places where we don't live, but someone does. It is a way of serving God.

Our church has been finding new and improved ways of serving God by caring for the earth this spring. You have all helped, which is wonderful. We will continue to improve in this area in the coming years, I know.

Two other things have been going on in my family to make me more aware of caring for the earth. Our daughter Kirsten is working right now for Ohio Citizen Action, an environmental advocacy group. She goes door to door to raise awareness and funds for the efforts of the group. Since they cover a huge area in and outside of Cuyahoga County, you never know when she might show up even on your doorstep! Meanwhile, our daughter Maren will be working as the naturalist at Camp Asbury this summer. She will be introducing campers to the earth in ways that will encourage them to see caring for the earth as serving God. Plus, she will just have an opportunity simply to share wonder with them.

So this summer we here at Brecksville will continue to look at this interesting relationship of life that we have with the earth and with God. The texts each week will explore the relationship of the people of God and the earth, both in the Old and New Testaments. It will be a celebration, but also a way to help us reflect on our relationship with God and each other.

I hope that you will find something to think about each week that you will carry with you to home, to work, to your backyard, the hiking trails, and on summer vacations. The Earth is the Lord's—and it is a great place to live.



National Trails Day



Join the 9th annual Adopt-a-Trail Training Workshop to be held on National Trails Day, Saturday, June 5, 2010. PROJECT 2010 UPDATE



In January, BUMC launched Project 2010. When we began, 53 individual pledge cards were submitted totaling 1346 hours pledged. Have you been wondering how we're doing?



Alice Muses about Modernity

A Column of Ongoing Response to our Worship Surveys

Have you met me? That's not a bizarre rhetorical question. If you attend worship regularly, I hope our paths have crossed. If not, introduce yourself one day soon. In the meantime allow me to paint a basic picture for the purposes of this article: I am 29 years old, reasonably open-minded, and I like to fancy myself pretty "with it". Nonetheless, I must confess: I am a bit of a stick in the mud when it comes to the latest, greatest technology. I held out until I was 20-something before getting my first cell phone. I actually got a little anxious when a friend gave me an iPod as a gift, because I wasn't sure I wanted it. I dislike television immensely, I staunchly refuse to tweet (whatever that is), and I feel mildly uncomfortable even *having* a Facebook account.

If you're nodding your head in agreement, or if you're wondering what all this tweet and Facebook nonsense even *is*, this article may be for you. Technology can be a difficult subject. It seeks to make our lives easier and more efficient, but it often ends up commanding our attention and taking up more time than we might have expected. With the ease of email comes a tendency not to pick up the phone or speak to people in person. With the convenience of an iPod comes the expense of purchasing songs and the tendency to walk through the day with our ears plugged. With the endless options available to us through cable TV, Netflix, and Redbox, we have collectively become far less likely to read.

As you might imagine, the decision to install screens in our Sanctuary was undertaken with a great deal of prayer and deep consideration. Making such a large aesthetic change is never to be taken lightly, and it represented a philosophical adjustment as well. When the Worship Committee re-

viewed our worship surveys, we identified this as one area that is still of concern to some. Among the questions posed: are we really "meditating" when we view huge, moving, digital images or have we lost the concept of *real* meditation? Are we losing something by not opening the physical Bibles and hymnals that are parked in the pew backs? The answer may surprise you: yes, perhaps things are lost, and it can be a bitter-sweet transition.

Throughout Scripture and the history since, men and women have struggled with the dilemma of advancing culture. The early church felt that valuable tradition and piety was lost by not requiring new Christians to be circumcised in the Jewish tradition. Martin Luther more or less described having an organ in worship as a sign of the devil. Our Methodist founder John Wesley said that he had no objection to musical instruments in the wor-

ship space, provided they were neither seen nor heard. At least he had a sense of humor about it!

Friends, this is the world in which we live. It is a world full of digital graphics and digital communication. And though we are not to limit our thinking to things *of* this world, we are certainly called to live and minister *in* it. We are here to welcome in every person – traditionalists and technology junkies alike. We believe that in today's landscape, our screens make that mission a little more possible.

But the Bibles and hymnals are still there for you in the seat back pocket. And, as I think John Wesley might quip, you can always close your eyes. In good humor and ever convinced that God's grace is sufficient for all our little quandaries...


