Good Samaritan Day

The Rotation Kids (grades 1-5) celebrated Good Samaritan Day on February 19. We gathered in Fellowship Hall to hear the story of the Good Samaritan, play some "Love your Neighbor" games and make blankets to be donated to Project Linus. It was a fun and active morning. What is the Project Linus?

On Christmas Eve, 1995, an article titled "Joy to the World" appeared in *Parade Magazine*. It was written by Pulitzer Prize winning photo-journalist, Eddie Adams. Part of the article featured a petite, downy haired child. She had been going through intensive chemotherapy and stated that her security blanket helped her get through the treatments. After reading the article, Karen Loucks decided to provide homemade security blankets to Denver's Rocky Mountain Children's Cancer Center, and Project Linus was born.

But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him? - 1 John 3:17

Project Linus is a non-profit organization whose mission is to provide love, a sense of security, warmth and comfort to children who are seriously ill, traumatized, or otherwise in need through the gifts of new, handmade blankets and afghans, lovingly created by volunteer "blanketeers."



Project Linus National Headquarters is in Bloomington, Illinois but they have chapters in all 50 states. Blankets are collected locally and distributed to children in hospitals, shelters, social service agencies, or anywhere that a child might be in need of a big hug. The blankets made by the children of BUMC will stay in the Cleveland area. Distribution points are the Cleveland Clinic, Rainbow, Child Witnesses to Violence and the Red Cross.

Good Samaritan Involvement Day, also known as Good Samaritan Day, is observed on March 13th in the United States. It takes place on the anniversary of the death of Catherine- Kitty- Genovese, who was killed in New York City while multiple bystanders stood by and did nothing to help her. Good Samaritan Involvement Day is a day for unselfish actions to help those who are in need.

Comments from Rev. Clark Stein

"And on that day', says the Lord God, I will make the sun go down at noon, and darken the earth in broad daylight. I will turn your feasts into mourning, and all your songs into

lamentation; I will bring sackcloth upon all loins, and baldness on every head; I will make it like the mourning for an only son, and the end of it like a bitter day."

- Amos 8:9-10 RSV

March seems like such a "tweener" month to me. Often winter still rages, yet in between sporadic blasts we are privileged to greet promising signs of spring around the corner. On the one hand, I am ready to see winter go, (I am not much for shoveling the driveway, and do not like to be cold ever) but I want spring sprung, not just a day to day maybe. Baseball starts "spring training", but the real games don't start until April, still allowing March that "tweener" feel. There's no way around experiencing times of transition, and that could very well be where March is destined to languish in this not so tropical climate of Northeast Ohio.

One certainty of March is the journey through Lent. Much of our Lenten observance takes place in this month, and in that regard, March holds much promise. The structure of the month takes us right on up to the brink of the passion. When I think of the journey we are called to make as Christians, a yearly pilgrimage through some of the darkest moments in history, I am taken by this prophecy contained in this passage from the book of Amos. In light of the events of Good Friday, this prophecy rings eerily in the middle of a book which contains some wonderful visions of a better place and time.

We all look to better places and times, and can find many such descriptions in scripture. But as March begins to settle in around us, let us not succumb to the temptations to become "tweeners" ourselves. It is only through an intentional time aside, a very deliberate, committed attempt to look at the darkness, that one can come to a deeper understanding of the intensity of the light that eventually will spring from it. As we journey together through this time of contemplation and discovery, may we be brave enough to face the full fledged darkness, that at this "tweener" month's end will place us on the porch of spring and brand spankin' new life. Join us as we celebrate Girl Scout Sunday on March 11!



World Water Day is March 22; it is a day established by the United Nations to look at water issues around the world. Did you know that that **one in eight people do not have safe water to drink** and that this, coupled with poor sanitation, results in 4,000 children dying every day?

We are blessed to live in this bountiful region of the world where we have safe, clean drinking water any time we walk up to a faucet. Lately, there's been lots of discussion concerning environmental controls placed on our water ways. Some residents around the Great Lakes feel that this natural resource is boundless. It has not been very long since the health of our River and our Lake were tenuous. Have you ever wondered about the rebound the Cuyahoga River has made since the fire of 1969?

On June 22nd, 1969, a fire started on the Cuyahoga River; a bit of molten steel fell off of a rail car crossing a bridge over the river. The river had a slick of industrial waste floating on its surface and that slick caught fire. It is remarkable all that has happened over the past 43 years to lead to such changes in the water quality of the River and our Lake?

The Cuyahoga River fire lasted just thirty minutes, but it did approximately fifty thousand dollars in damage -- principally to some railroad bridges spanning the river. This was not the first time that the river had caught on fire. Fires occurred on the Cuyahoga River in 1868, 1883, 1887, 1912, 1922, 1936, 1941, 1948, and in 1952. The 1952 fire caused over 1.5 million dollars in damage. The Cleveland Press and the Plain Dealer carried the story but the 1969 fire was not big news.

Then on August 1, 1969, *Time* magazine reported on the fire and on the condition of the Cuyahoga River. The magazine stated,

Some River! Chocolate-brown, oily, bubbling with subsurface gases, it oozes rather than flows. "Anyone who falls into the Cuyahoga does not drown," Cleveland's citizens joke grimly. "He decays"... The Federal Water Pollution Control Administration dryly notes: "The lower Cuyahoga has no visible signs of life, not even low forms such as leeches and sludge worms that usually thrive on wastes." It is also -- literally -a fire hazard. Because of this fire, Cleveland businesses became infamous for their pollution, a legacy of the city's booming manufacturing days during the late 1800s and the early 1900s, when few environmental controls existed. Even following World War II, Cleveland businesses, especially steel mills, routinely polluted the river. Cleveland and its river became the source of jokes across the United States. What many people do not know is that one year before the 1969 fire Cleveland had approved a \$100 million plan to improve the Cuyahoga River's water. The fire shined light on the widespread problem of water pollution across the country.

The city began the long process of trying to find the specific sources of the pollution and make changes to help clean the water. Field crews identified discharge pipes along the banks of the river. One by one, facilities (factories and businesses) were tested using a colored dye added to their drains until each was verified at the discharge point along the river. All facilities except the major steel mills were tested. The steel mills were meeting with USEPA to negotiate a reduction of wastes to the river. The owners of these facilities were later notified and asked to attend a meeting with the Water Quality Program office to explain the pollution sources found. Each was asked to remove this source by rerouting their flows into the City of Cleveland sewer system.

This Water Quality Program continued to reduce pollutants from the area streams – and there was a marked increase in water quality in the river as well as the shore of Lake Erie. The remaining combined sewer overflows were later targeted by what would become the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District.

The Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District was formed in 1972 to own and operate the plants and interceptor sewers. This was another recommendation of the city's Master Plan as well as several other studies and, later, a court order. The Regional Sewer District continued to improve the wastewater plants and to construct several interceptors and tunnels to capture and convey wastewater to the plants.

At the state level, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency was formed. At the national level, several departments and agencies were combined to form the USEPA. A memo to President Nixon from the President's Advisory Council on Executive Organization recommended that key anti-pollution programs be merged into an Environmental Protection Agency. The Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972 (PL. 92-500, The Clean Water Act) was passed by Congress which created financial assistance to water quality programs across the country. *Jenny Gee , Director of Education*
