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What Do We Look for on Sunday Morning?

Comments from Rev. Clark Stein

"If God gives such attention to the appearance of wildflowers—most of which are never even seen—don't you think he'll attend

to you, take pride in you, do his best for you? What I'm trying to do here is to get you to relax, to not be so preoccupied with getting, so you can respond to God's giving. People who don't know God and the way he works fuss over these things, but you know both God and how he works. Steep your life in God-reality, God-initiative, God-provisions. Don't worry about missing out. You'll find all your everyday human concerns will be met." - Matthew 6:33

Jim Smith went to church on Sunday morning. He heard the organist miss a note during the prelude, and he winced. He saw a teenager talking when everybody was supposed to be bowed in silent prayer. He felt like the usher was watching to see what he put in the offering plate and it made him boil. He caught the preacher making a slip of the tongue five times in the sermon by actual count. As he slipped out through the side door during the closing hymn, he muttered to himself, "Never again, what a bunch of clods and hypocrites!"

Ron Jones went to church one Sunday morning. He heard the organist play an arrangement of "A Mighty Fortress" and thrilled at the majesty of it. He heard a young girl take a moment in the service to speak her simple moving message on the difference her faith makes in her life. He was glad to see that the church was sharing in a special offering for the hungry children of Nigeria. He especially appreciated the sermon that Sunday- it answered a question that had bothered him for a long time. He thought as he walked out of the doors of the church, "How can a man come here and not feel the presence of God?"

Both men went to the same church on the same Sunday morning. Each found what he was looking for. What do we look for on a Sunday morning?

The labyrinth will be available for times of reflection and meditation each Wednesday evening during the Lenten season. You are encouraged to take time for this valuable exercise either before or after weekly services. Methodism 101: What is Lent?

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 13) and ends on Holy Saturday (March 30). Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word *lencten*, which means "spring." The forty days represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection. Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of themselves for others. The list on this page may help inspire you on your Lenten journey.

Giving up something we enjoy can remind us of Jesus' giving up his life for us. Adding something to our days can, too! Try some of these ideas:

Enliven Your Prayers

- ◆ Spend time in solitude each day.
- ◆ Keep a journal of prayer concerns, questions, reading.
- ◆ Focus on thanksgiving, rather than on asking, in prayer.
- ◆ Make a prayer list of people with whom you need to be reconciled. Pray for guidance.
- ◆ Dance your prayers to music.
- ◆ Visit the Labyrinth on Wed. evenings.
- ◆ Keep a list of daily "God Sightings".
- ◆ Pray the Paper (for items in the news)

Practice Determined Service

- ◆ Give 5 items of clothing to Goodwill.
- ◆ Give to a local non-profit
- ◆ Resolve to take on some loving task.
- ◆ Start recycling waste from your home.
- ◆ Give blood and recall the cross.
- ◆ Do someone else's chore.
- ◆ Participate in BUMC's canned food drive for Parma Food Pantry.

Engage in Honest Worship

- ◆ Share in the Lenten Prayer Service on Wednesday evenings at BUMC.
- ◆ Make time for the Education Hour on Sunday mornings.
- ◆ Go to Ash Wednesday Worship and Tennebrae Service as an act of love and waiting with Jesus.
- ◆ Decide to become a member of the church. Speak to Pastor Clark about it.

Reach Out to Others

- ◆ Call an old friend
- ◆ Forgive someone
- ◆ Introduce yourself to a neighbor
- ◆ Write a thank you note
- ◆ Write a letter to a person who has touched your life.
- ◆ Visit a "shut-in" neighbor

Center Yourself

- ◆ Take a break from the Internet
- ◆ Tell someone what you are grateful for
- ◆ Take a vacation from shopping.
- ◆ Read a book for inner growth.
- ◆ Go to bed earlier or sleep in later.
- ◆ Schedule time to inventory your priorities and plan how you will reorder them.
- ◆ Give up a grudge.
- ◆ Forgive someone who has hurt you.
- ◆ Say "no" to gossip.

Pastor Libby has done a great job providing pastoral care by visiting church members and their families in hospitals, nursing homes, and in their homes. She has prayed with and counseled those in need since she took care of her mother for 18 years and worked with the Alzheimer's Association. She has a special concern for members with aging parents. 

And as this issue went to press, we hosted *An Evening of Jazz with Josh Rzepka and Jackie Warren* on January 26.



Workshop. Hands on Missions.



Last April, after our Lenten study of “The Hole in Our Gospel,” the members of Brecksville United Methodist Church participated in a hands-on mission project we called “Workshop” where our Sunday worship time was a time of hands-on missions service.

What did we accomplish? During Workshop we packed 33 baby kits, 49 cloth bag school kits, 23 backpack school kits, 93 pairs of underwear, 188 rolls of toilet paper and 289 toiletry items. The estimated monetary value of your generosity was \$3134. The baby kits and cloth bag school kits were delivered to Church World services and were distributed internationally. The backpack school kits were distributed through our association with the Cleveland Native American Center, and the underwear, toilet paper and toiletries were distributed through local relief agencies. In addition, Workshop participants wrote letters to U.S. politicians asking them to support legislation to end human trafficking and wrote cards to prisoners.

Are you ready to do more? The Worship Staff and Mission Committee are planning the next Workshop event for April, a few weeks after Easter. This event will be in coordination with Stop Hunger Now, an international food aid organization, and will involve packing meals for distribution internationally.

You can learn more about Stop Hunger now at their web site, stophungernow.org. Their vision is “A world without hunger,” and their mission is, “To end hunger in our lifetime by providing food and life-saving aid to the world’s most vulnerable and by creating a global commitment to mobilizing the necessary resources.” Be sure and see the “frequently asked questions” tab for in depth insight into how the process works.

Stop Hunger Now began in 1998, and has been doing food packing since 2005. Cec and I were able to participate in one of their meal packing events at our son’s church in Richmond, Virginia. In just under two hours about 60 people packed 10,000 meals consisting of soy protein, rice, freeze dried vegetables and a vitamin/mineral/flavor packet. Participants ranged in age from 8 to 80. While supporting a very worthy cause everyone enjoyed a great time of fellowship.

To see an independent evaluation of Stop Hunger Now as a charitable organization, go to charitynavigator.org. Charity Navigator is “America’s leading independent charity evaluator.” There you will see that Stop Hunger now received a three out of four star rating with a perfect score for accountability and transparency.

The Worship Staff and Missions Committee are excited about this hands-on mission opportunity. You’ll be hearing more on Sundays over the next several weeks. We hope you will prayerfully consider how you might be involved.

Summer middle school VBS was an amazing week of sharing, teaching, worship, and learning through art, acting, and videos with a lot of help from Joy Parker and George Gee.

Late summer saw the introduction of our BY Wednesday Worship evenings. In Hye and I aimed to introduce healthy world cuisines and old favorites to the youth while we get to know each other over a fun dinner, share our days, and laugh a lot. Our hands-on worship in the chapel has included skits, drawing, ice-breakers, and tons of art and videos as we've traced out an accurate picture of Jesus, our friend and Lord. The middle and high school youth have begun to gel and I've been blown away by their willingness to serve each other, sing to God, and share their hearts. Some youth have brought friends to our worship, others have encouraged their siblings, and a few more have been brave to lead us in worship.

November saw forty-two parents and youth join our Faith & Family night as we traveled to see an exciting overtime Monsters game. It was a great inter-generational night of the church coming together and we look forward to more of these including our Faith & Family movie night in January. Our youth and parents also came together powerfully over our Christmas mission as we sought to help our Native American youth brothers and sisters with toy and clothing donations. The giving was a blessed abundance. Another highlight came as many of our youth served tirelessly alongside adults at the Native American Christmas party in a gracious showing of Christian love.

While 2012 laid a promising spiritual, theological, and relational foundation, we're ready to build on top of that this year. At our worship our youth have entered into planning what changes are necessary globally and in our community, as well as how they would like to grow individually and as a group in Christ. Several students have prayed for the growth of our youth group, asking importantly, "how can we encourage more youth at our church to come to worship and Sunday school?" Others prayed that our group can do more to change big problems in Syria, with the environment, and in Cleveland. So meaningful too were prayerful goals for personal transformation with students seeking to "judge less," "be more helpful to others," and several students aiming to "spend more time with God this year with daily devotions."

With a great confirmation program underway, more service and social outings on the way, and a focus on personal and group transformation, we are praying for big things 2013. Won't you pray with us?

What Is a Labyrinth?

Labyrinths have long been used as meditation and prayer tools. A labyrinth is an ancient symbol that relates to wholeness, combining the imagery of a circle and a spiral into a meandering but purposeful path. It represents a journey to our own center and back out into the world again.



Labyrinths and mazes are sometimes confused. A maze is a puzzle to be solved. It has twists, turns, and blind alleys. A labyrinth has only one path. The way in is the way out. There are no blind alleys. The path leads you on a circuitous path to the center and out again. With a maze many choices must be made and an active mind is needed to solve the problem of finding the center. With a labyrinth there is only one choice to be made. The choice is to enter or not. If you choose to walk our labyrinth during Lent, try using these steps.

Three stages of the walk

Purgation (Releasing) ~ As you enter the Labyrinth, let go of the details of your life. Shed thoughts and distractions. Take time to open the heart and quiet the mind.

Illumination (Receiving) ~ When you reach the center, stay there as long as you like. It is a place of meditation and prayer. You can choose to stay in silence or reflect on a challenge you are facing. Receive what is there for you to receive.

Union (Returning) ~ As you leave, you will follow the same path out of the Labyrinth center that you followed in. This is the time you enter the third stage, which is joining God and God's healing forces at work in the world. Each time you walk the labyrinth you become more empowered to find and do the work for which you feel your soul is reaching. - Jenny Gee
