
Bicentennial Choir

Two hundred years ago, in 1814, Lemuel and Delia Bourne held the first Christian worship in their home situated at the corner of Brecksville and Snowville Roads. They invited the whole town to show up and worship with them and all 16 people did! From that day on, the Bournes and others worshipped in each other's homes organized as the Brecksville Methodist Society. They were occasionally visited by a circuit rider. In the year 1832 they were able to afford the construction of a small church. It is from these modest beginnings that the community of the Brecksville United Methodist Church has grown.

We will celebrate this monumental occasion on Sunday, September 21 with one very special worship service at 10 which will focus on our roots as a worshipping people. Directly after this worship we will enjoy each other's company on the square as we enjoy a picnic potluck. Sloppy Joes will be provided by our Evangelism Committee. In true Methodist tradition, please bring a dish to share. Throughout the afternoon you will have the chance to play games, listen to music, take a history hike, pose for some old fashioned photos, unveil the new church history timeline, create a button for our memory quilt and most importantly catch up with friends. Activities begin after the 10 o'clock worship and continue until 3 pm.


Coffee Has Its Rewards!

Our VBS Mission Campaign Faces a New Challenge

This year at Vacation Bible School we challenged the children to do extra chores around their own homes, for their neighbors or for their grandparents to earn a few extra dollars to help send a child to school for a year. Throughout the week we talked about how children in some faraway places cannot afford to go to school and about how lucky we are to be able to go to school, get a good education and grow up to do good work. We committed to try to bring in \$500 which would be enough for to pay tuition, board and food for one student for a year at Camphor Mission. We were successful!! The children brought in \$586!

Janet Kleckner knows a young woman by the name of Wallace Etta Joe. Although she is a teenager, she has recently completed 4th grade. Wallace Etta is from the area (but far enough away that she is a boarding student) and her father recently suffered a stroke - so the family is really struggling. Wallace Etta participated in the Three Simple Rules study Janet did for the girls last September. Wallace Etta is a very good student and was selected in March to participate in the first ever county-wide spelling bee. We now need to see the best way to get money to the school to pay for her tuition as travel has been stopped temporarily because of the Ebola crisis. Stay tuned for more developments!





United Methodist Communications Fights Ebola with Technology

Nashville, Tenn.: Efforts to contain the Ebola outbreak have met difficulties due to widespread myths and misinformation about the deadly virus. In collaboration with bishops in Sierra Leone and Liberia, and their communicators, <u>United Methodist Communications</u> has implemented a crisis communications strategy in West Africa aimed at controlling the outbreak, saving lives and comforting those affected by this epidemic.

United Methodist Communications is also in contact with bishops in Nigeria and Cote d'Ivoire.

"In the Ebola crisis, communication precedes prevention and treatment," said the Rev. Larry Hollon, chief executive of United Methodist Communications. "The contagion cannot be contained without clear communication about the reality of the Ebola virus, sanitation, isolation of sick people, and proper handling of the deceased. This has to be communicated effectively and widely. In these circumstances, a clear message saves lives."

Sierra Leone and Liberia received \$10,000 crisis communications grants to create and distribute banners, posters and photocopies of messages that aid in prevention, diagnosis and treatment; messaging for radio to address prevention, care and pastoral needs; and Internet access.

Additionally, at the request of Bishop Innis and his communicator, Julu Swen, United Methodist Communications is sending text messages to church leaders in Liberia to keep them informed and encouraged in this time of crisis. African communicators are being equipped and trained to take over this communication in the near future.

United Methodist Communications' Information and Communications Technologies for Development (ICT4D) team learned from a recent CNET report that the majority of the telecommunications market in Liberia is wireless, with 69% relying on mobile phones. That number is 67% in Sierra Leone, making text messages a crucial way to distribute prayers for encouragement and life-saving messages.

The first text message was sent today, August 19, on behalf of Bishop John Innis of Liberia to his district superintendents. The agency will also be sending approved health and pastoral messages on the bishop's behalf until the Liberian conference communicator takes over the task. The message sent today reads: Ebola is real. It kills with little warning. Please adhere to health messages to safeguard your family. Let us be in prayer. God is with us.—Bishop John Innis.

"Prayers of Encouragement," an Upper Room publication, will be made available to World Reader users in a variety of formats, including tablets, smartphones and biNu, billed as "Your Smartphone in the Cloud." This is technology that United Methodist Communications has tested and used previously and is well-received in developing nations. Additionally, the agency will send words of encouragement from this booklet via text.

The agency has also partnered with Iheed and award-winning animator and activist <u>Firdaus Kharas</u> of Chocolate Moose Media to create a short animation that promotes prevention and dispels local rumors. The animation will be made available in local dialects for use by community health workers and for television.

Along with these efforts, the United Methodist Committee on Relief, Church of the Resurrection and the Indiana Conference of The United Methodist Church have all sent grants to affected countries. These funds support United Methodist hospitals and health clinics, and will be used to purchase supplies for patient treatment and management, construction of isolation wards, and training of front line personnel to protect themselves from infection.

The Foundation for United Methodist Communications has established an emergency communications fund where <u>individuals can donate to provide communications support</u> in crises and disasters, such as this outbreak.
