The excitement for Vacation Bible School is building at Brecksville United Methodist Church!

BRECKSVILLE UMC will COME ALIVE this summer with MOVEMENT and ACTION as close to 100 kids (and their teen and adult leaders) STEP OUT in FAITH. Be ready to see our church TRANSFORMED into a kid friendly skate park. Kids will EXPLORE how to put their FAITH into ACTION. In this mission-focused VBS, kids EXPERIENCE God's unstoppable love and DISCOVER how to fuel up and EXPERIENCE life with God!

What does a typical day at Vacation Bible School look like? We start each morning with a funny and fast paced skit that explains our theme for the day. This is also a time when the children get to stretch and get pumped up by singing and dancing to the awesome VBS music.

After our assembly time the children will move on to their sessions, one such session is Scripture Zone.

Throughout the week children will hear five different interactive Bible stories which help them discover God at work in their lives and experience the love of Jesus. The Bible stories told during this G-Force VBS explores how a life with God is an active one. We will learn about people from the Bible who followed God with their hearts, minds and bodies.



Throughout the rest of the morning the kids attend other sessions including The Science Zone, Craft Zone and Recreation Zone. Children will take the Bible lesson for the day and hear about it in interesting and unique ways as they enjoy these activities. In addition to these exciting and engaging sessions kids will enjoy a snack and a time of learning about the week's mission. 

SUMMER BOOK SERIES

Wednesday Evenings 7 pm: July 1, July 29 & August 26

You are invited to be a part of open and honest conversation on the theme of violence as it manifests itself, both in war and in times of supposed peace. Discussion will be led by Joy Parker, Director of Worship, and the conversation is open to all. Whether you are a person of faith or not, regardless of your political affiliation (or lack thereof), and whatever your background, you are welcome. The only requirement is a genuine desire to be in open, honest conversation with others in a respectful and edifying environment. There is no charge for book discussion (other than the cost of the books); dessert and beverages will be provided.

Killing from the Inside Out: Moral Injury and Just War by Robert Emmett Meagher (2014)

This conversation will take place in the church parlor (2nd floor)

Armies know all about killing. It is what they do, and ours does it more effectively than most. We are coming to realize, however, that we are also especially good at killing our own "from the inside out," silently, invisibly. In every major war since Korea, more of our veterans have taken their lives than have lost them in combat. Robert Meagher asks how veterans can be suffering under

the weight of "moral injury" even in conflicts that are viewed as "just" or justified, examining the "Just War Theory" that has grown up over the centuries in our churches and political institutions alike. Ultimately, *Killing from the Inside Out* radically questions the notion of just war, examines its legacy, and challenges readers to look beyond it for wisdom that is, at once, both ancient and new. Gunfight: The Battle Over the Right to Bear Arms in America by Adam Winkler (2013)

In Gunfight, Adam Winkler takes an objective look at the evolution of constitutional law and public opinion around the issue of gun possession. Winkler defends both sides of the argument on their merits and is equally willing to level critique where it is deserved. Readers will learn a great deal about the formation of the NRA, the history of interpretation of the Second Amendment, and landmark



If one searches via google with the words, "Why are Christians so ..." this is what shows up as the most likely searches:



This predictive search algorithm is based on popular searches to predict a user's search query as it is typed.

There seems to be a disconnect. A tradition based in love of God, neighbor, and self is perceived by many as arrogant, judgmental and mean. Could this modern perception of Christianity be a leading cause of many young people turning away from religion all together?
