PEACE LIKE A RIVER

Late one evening I was sitting on our couch, exhausted from the day's events and overwhelmed with all that was yet to be done. I leaned my head back against the couch, and said a simple prayer: "God, I'm tired."

Then I noticed the sign sitting on our fireplace mantle, with the old hymn title/phrase "It is well with my soul."

The first verse ran through my mind:

When peace like a river, attendeth my way,

When sorrows like sea billows roll;

Whatever my lot,

Thou hast taught me to know

It is well, it is well, with my soul.

Curious, I dug into the history of this hymn. I discovered that Horatio Spafford wrote it after several traumatic events in his life. His fouryear-old son died, he was financially ruined by 1871's Great Chicago
Fire, and then while his family was
on a trip across the Atlantic (he was
to join them later) their ship sank
and his four daughters drowned.
Then, as Spafford traveled to meet
his grieving wife, his ship passed
near where his daughters had died
and he was inspired to pen this
hymn.

2021 has not been an easy year. Many of us thought (or hoped) that things would be "back to normal" by now. And yet, in many ways, COVID is still keeping us on our toes, with waves of uncertainty, exhaustion, and change still hitting us, and knocking us off-balance. It's easy to lament, wondering why things still have to be so hard.

And yet, even in the midst of the hard, it's good to remember:

No pang shall be mine,

for in death as in life,

Thou wilt whisper

Thy peace to my soul.

No matter what, God will whisper God's peace into our souls.

May you go into these last two months of 2021 feeling God's whisper of peace; knowing that whatever difficult thing you are experiencing, it is well with your soul.

You are not alone. God is with you, loving you beyond measure. And your community of faith is here waiting to wrap its arms around you like a loving parent.


Giving Spokes to Folks!

Come hear Liv Randall, Development Director for US Together, as she presents 'Refugee 101' - Wednesday, November 4 at 7 pm in Fellowship Hall.

Cleveland has been welcoming refugees into our community for generations, and we are about to see the most refugees coming to the city since the 1990's - over 1,200 people! The best way to welcome our new neighbors is by educating ourselves. What is a refugee? What did they go through to get here?

Refugee 101 will teach us about refugee resettlement in Cleveland. Learn about US Together's work, different immigration statuses, the process of how refugees come to the United States, where Cleveland refugees are from, the crises Cleveland refugees have fled (Afghanistan, DRC, Myanmar, Ukraine), the resettlement process, and how to get involved in local refugee resettlement. The presentation will be followed by a Q&A. Bring your questions!

Presenter Liv Randall was born and raised in Brecksville and graduated from Ohio State University where she studied International Relations and Middle East Studies with a minor in Arabic. Her passion as an undergrad was conducting international research in Rwanda on the reconciliation process between women after genocide. After graduation, Liv was hired to be an Americorps VISTA for a year at US Together in Cleveland. In July of this year, Liv was hired as a full-time employee of US Together, as Development Specialist of all three offices, with a focus on Cleveland. Her main roles include developing the interpreter services department, building community partnerships, and fundraising.

Four Gratitude Rituals To Try With Your Teen




As we welcome November, we dive into a season of spending more time with family, caring for our loved ones, and talking about what it means to show gratitude. Making gratitude a habit, and not just something we think about around Thanksgiving, is beneficial for the whole family. It becomes increasingly important in the lives of teenagers. Social media can be a place where teens compare their lives to those of their peers and celebrities, making them feel left out and left behind. They can feel that they need more and more, missing out on the blessings they already have in their lives. Cultivating gratitude can reduce stress, increase happiness, and help us to live in the moment. Teens learn from the actions of those around them. Parents who model gratitude and make it a priority in their own lives leave a lasting imprint. This season of the year is a great time to try weekly and daily rituals which help make gratitude a way of life. Here are four ideas to try with your teen this month:

- **Gratitude Journal** At the end of the day, before bed, write down five things you are grateful for in your journal. This could even be a list on your phone. Revisit your lists on tough days and remind yourself of all the wonderful things in your life.
- **Thank a Teacher** It may seem simple, but a thank you card to a teacher is a gift that goes two ways. The teacher and the student both smile! It has been a challenging year for our educators and showing our appreciation means more now than ever before. Have your teen write a card and give it to their teacher.
- **Embrace Quiet** We seem to want to fill every second of our day with noise, but silence can be a retreat from our everyday. Embrace quiet moments as a time to reflect on what you are thankful for. Breathe in for five seconds, hold for three, then breathe out for six seconds. When you breathe in think "I am grateful" and when you breathe out think "For this moment." It is a simple meditation that could change your day.
- **Nature Hike** Go for a hike at a park with your teen and name out loud the things you see that you are grateful for. Research has revealed that exposure to nature not only makes you feel better emotionally, it

contributes to our physical wellbeing - reducing blood pressure, heart rate, muscle tension, and the production of stress hormones. Nature is a healing and wonderful place to connect with your teen. And that's something to be thankful for!


UMW Presents Author Mary Reynolds Powell

Year End Giving Options

A Reminder from the Finance Committee

With the end of the year fast approaching and anticipated postal delays, it is highly recommended you plan your year end giving early and process any Donor Advised Funds, IRAs, QCDs, Stocks or financial institution gifts soon. To be credited to your 2021 giving, gifts must be received in the church office by Friday, December 31 at noon.

QCDs/IRA Charitable Rollover: A Special Opportunity for Those 70½ Years Old and Older—You can give any amount (up to a maximum of \$100,000) per year from your IRA directly to a qualified charity such as Brecksville United Methodist Church without having to pay income taxes on the money. Gifts of any value \$100,000 or less are eligible for this benefit and you can feel good knowing that you are making a difference through our church. This popular gift option is commonly called the IRA charitable rollover, but you may also see it referred to as a qualified charitable distribution, or QCD for short.

Donor Advised Fund Gifts—(DAF), which is like a charitable savings account, gives you the flexibility to recommend how much and how often money is granted to Brecksville United Methodist Church and other qualified charities. You can recommend a grant or recurring grants now to make an immediate impact or use your fund as a tool for future charitable gifts.

Donate Stock/Securities—The most popular and efficient way to transfer securities to Brecksville UMC is by electronic transfer to the church's bank account. This is done through a free delivery, which means the church gets 100% of the value of the transfer. Please notify your broker of your intent to make a gift of securities to Brecksville United Methodist Church. The broker will need the name of the stock, number of shares and other information.
