### **CLOSE TO HOME**

We get to move all our belongings out of the parsonage by the first Sunday of December. No, we're not moving. Thanks to the Planned Expense Fund, all our floors are being redone: the carpeting is being removed and the hardwood underneath is being refinished.

Last weekend, I was talking with a friend about our preparations, and they asked, "So when do you need to move out?" One of my kids overheard, and with tears in their eyes, in a panicked voice they exclaimed, "We're moving?!"

Thanks to their pastor-mom, my kids have moved quite a few times in their short lives. Through all those moves we've learned that home is not a place, but a feeling. You can live somewhere and it doesn't "feel like home." In the same right, you can arrive at a place and immediately feel at home.

I've shared before how it didn't take long for us to feel at home in

Brecksville. So it's no surprise that my child would be upset with the prospect of us moving. Because home is a very sacred place. It's a place where we can let our guard down, take a deep breath, rest, and recuperate from the day's events. It's a place of comfort and peace and hope.

At least it should be.

For some, home is not like that, but rather it's a place of anxiety and pain. It's a place where the guard goes up and you never feel welcome as you are. Or it's a place where you feel isolated and alone.

This year for Advent, our theme is Close to Home. It recognizes the "now but not yet" of this world; that although this world is often beautiful and comforting, it is also a place of hurt and heartache.

In this world, we are close to home, but not quite there. Because our true home is with God in God's kin -dom.

And as a church—as followers of Christ—our task is to bring glimpses of God's kin-dom "on earth as it is in heaven;" to create a safe space where we can let our guard down, take a deep breath, rest, and recuperate from life's events.

Our task is to help people feel at home in this world—to feel "at God" in this world.

This newsletter is filled with opportunities for you to feel at home with God this Advent, and to help create spaces for others to feel at home, too.

So as we move into this Advent season, may we be comforted by the One who dwells intimately with us. May we expand safety and sanctuary for everyone wandering far from home. May we come home, wherever home is found—to live fully with joy, hope, and courage.




The Heart that Grew Three Sizes: Finding the True Meaning of Christmas in the Grinch Sundays 11/28-12/19 at 11 am, Room 301














# Christmas Eve at Brecksville United Methodist Church

**Honest Worship** is integral to who we are at BUMC. In fact, it's one of our values! We invite everyone to participate in worship authentically and holistically: heart, mind, soul, and body. This means...

- Coming as you are, in the messiness of life to wrestle with the questions of faith.
- Encountering God through different forms of worship opportunities.
- Encouraging everyone to contribute in our worship.

Worship is where we meet God, together. It's a safe space where we can come just as we are, whether that's joyful and full of hope and excitement, or exhausted and broken and weeping. It's a safe space—a sanctuary—where we do not have to conform to the expectations of this world, but simply *be*—be God's beloved child. And *breathe*—breathe out the hurt and doubt and fear, and breathe in God's healing Spirit of hope and wisdom and grace.

Worship is sanctuary; a chrysalis; it's coming home to God.

It's where we offer our bodies as a living sacrifice: singing God's praises; listening to ancient scriptures and marveling at how thousands of years later God can speak to us through them; moving to the Spirit's leading—dancing (swaying like good Methodists), bowing our heads, and reaching out our hands, offering our gifts to God; opening our eyes to the wonders God has placed right in front of us; and tasting the unconditional love of God in holy communion.

In worship, we practice giving God our whole selves so that when we go from our time together, we can give God our whole selves each and every day.

Worship at BUMC looks a little different than it did before the pandemic. At least the Sunday morning schedule does. We've kept the times consistent (8:30 & 10:00) year-round so we are more welcoming to first-time guests and those who are newer to our community (we don't have to worry about someone not getting the memo!).

These new times came out of the survey we took last spring. People said worship *time* was most important, so we did our best to come as close as possible to peoples' preferred worship times—moving the Education Hour to the end of the morning to make it all fit!

We scheduled the service with the worship band at 10:00 so that kids could go directly from Sprouts to the Education Hour, which seems to have worked very well! Jenny has seen a marked increase in attendance during Kids' Education Hour, and they're having a blast in their new space on the 4th floor!

The first service, too, with the choir singing and organ playing, seems to have gained new energy. And now that both services are indoors, we

are able to live stream both services. We have at least one third of our people joining online each week! (So if you don't see a familiar face or two, that doesn't mean they've disappeared—they might be joining from their couch!)

Worship at BUMC looks a little different than before the pandemic, and yet in the most important ways it has stayed the same. We come together in the messiness of life to wrestle with the questions of faith; we encounter God through different forms of worship opportunities; and we encourage everyone to contribute in our worship.

Each week I see proof of God's Spirit impacting people's lives as they encounter God's love and hope through worship. And each time, I'm grateful for this community, which has used the holy disturbance of the pandemic to embrace new opportunities.

When Pastor Heidi asked me to do a testimonial about why I give to the church I thought, "That will be simple. It's because my wife said so!"

To be honest, talking about giving is a bit awkward. I don't want to give anyone the impression that I have this "giving thing" figured out. Through my life I've matured in my faith and my thoughts about giving, but I still think I'm a work in progress and am very thankful that God has been patient with me.

The reason my wife, Sue, and I give is really quite simple. We recognize that we have been blessed and giving is our way of giving back.

I grew up in a small Methodist church and my parents were excellent role models. We went to church every Sunday. My sister and I had a goal of getting perfect attendance in Sunday school each year. Because the church was small, my parents were usually serving on more than one committee every year. They taught Sunday school and youth group and our family was active in all aspects of church life. Every Sunday I watched my parents put an envelope in the offering plate. Or to be more accurate, my sister and I would argue about who got to put the offering in the plate.

Even with my upbringing, in the years after I graduated from college, giving money to the church was not something that was on my list of priorities. At first, it seemed like the bills were always more than the money coming in. As time passed and our income increased, the bills seemed to increase at the same pace, if not faster.

Then, there was that part of me that thought I was working so very hard that I deserved to have more and more. I just felt like I earned it. I'd really lost sight of my roots and the many blessing in my life.

The truth is, the time of year when the church talked about stewardship made me uncomfortable. I didn't like it at all. But it was also during this time, shortly after we joined this church, that I started to turn things around. The church had a guest speaker who asked us to look at where we spend our money and how that spending fit our priorities. We were asked to consider areas where we could make some changes. When I looked where our money was being spent, I could identify areas we could change. Those changes really didn't hurt. In fact, the giving felt good.

But like I said, I'm a work in progress. This is a materialistic world. I continue to ask God for guidance. I no longer dread this time of year when we talk about stewardship, but look at it as an opportunity for reflection. I'm reminded of my grandma saying "count your blessings, not your burdens." And I still hear my dad's voice reminding me to know the difference between needs and wants. When there is so much need in the world, my focus can't be on what I want, especially because I have been blessed with plenty. And when I still might loose track of what's important, I have another blessing that helps me stay on track. In those times when I may start to stray, I'll do the right thing - because my wife said so. - Jeff Hastings



Let's give ourselves a round of applause for a successful Stewardship campaign! The numbers speak for themselves as we have received 124 pledges for \$433,305 for the 2022 budget compared to 120 received last year for \$412,593. That's close to a 5% increase! In addition, we received 53 pledges to the Planned Expense Fund for \$27,260, which is an 11% increase over last year. Even more extraordinary news is that 22 of these are NEW pledges!
