RISE UP BELOVED Trust in God's Promises

Annual Conference '25

I just returned from the 56th Annual Conference of the East Ohio Methodist Church, which took place on June 12–14, 2025, at the College of Wooster. It was a truly uplifting experience—here's a little glimpse into what happened:

Theme, Worship and Bible Study

The conference theme was "Rise Up, Beloved: Trust in God's Promises," inspired by Mark 5:35–43—the story of Jesus bringing Jairus's daughter back to life. Each morning, we experienced meaningful worship services at the McGaw Chapel. Each afternoon began with a Bible study led by Rev. Dr. AHyun Lee, titled: "Rise Up and Go: Soul Care Amid Trauma and Despair."

Thursday, June 12 - The Opening worship, included an Indigenous Drum Ceremony by the Gray Cloud Singers. followed by a acknowledgment by the conference of our responsibility to pursue mutually healing relationships with indigenous people. During this conference, we celebrated 140 vears since Mary Scranton and her son, William, traveled Cleveland to Korea missionaries. Bishop Seong-Bok Kim from Seoul provided the sermon and spoke about the impact that the introduction of Methodism had in Korea and on him personally. Bishop Kim was joined by several members of a delegation from South Korea, who attended Annual Conference this year.



Friday, June 13 - This service included the reading of the scripture in Spanish, commemoration of clergy and others who have passed away and Communion led by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung. The healing energy, joy and enthusiasm of our new bishop was inspiring! During his sermon, he challenged us all to "Trust in God's Promises," as well as to live into the new vision of loving boldly, serving joyfully and leading courageously. Bishop Jung has "Godsized" goals of planting 100 new churches in Ohio, as well as visiting every Methodist church in Ohio!

Saturday, June 14 - This Service of Licensing, Commissioning, Ordination, and Retirement, included a special sermon by retired Bishop Jonathan Keaton. Rev. James Winkler, former pastor at BUMC, is retiring and was recognized during the service. It was an honor to see Rev. Kathy Dickriede take an active leadership role in this service.

Business Sessions & Fellowship

Each afternoon, we gathered for plenary sessions covering a broad agendafrom constitutional voting on amendments. to hearing ministry reports, budgets and compensation discussions. An updated sexual ethics policy was voted upon and passed. Several Resolutions were passed. including the formation of an Ohio site for the Immigration Law and Justice Network, which provides free or lowcost legal services and advocacy for immigrants, refugees and asylum seekers. We received the good news that Pastor Heidi's appointment at BUMC was confirmed for the next year! Bishop Jung also announced the formation of an Ohio Episcopal Area Task Team, which includes members from both the East Ohio and West Ohio Conferences, one of whom is Pastor Heidi. This task force is charged with actively listening, discussing discerning to make recommendations to form a new, unified Ohio Conference. Bishop Jung encouraged all to see this as a re-creation, and that collaborations are not just for survival, but can be ways to open even more doors.

It wasn't all business, though! A lively Ministry Fair featuring 40 tables of local ministries, including a booth manned by **Craig Kotnik** for Nehemiah Mission, and a Midwest Mission collection truck ran both Thursday and Friday, gathering essential items for dignity and homecare kits. *Continues on page 6*

FROM THE PASTOR

What's On My Mind



You may have heard that we're in the beginning stages of a capital campaign.

And I'll be honest, I've been struggling the past few months to get excited about it. I know that practically we need a roof, parking lot, elevator, etc. for our church building. But those things are boring. Take a roof for example—you spend a bunch of money and don't really get to "enjoy" it (other than not getting rained on during worship!). And if I can't get excited about these things, then how am I supposed to get others to want to give their hard-earned money to it?

So I've been praying about it. A LOT.

Then, a few weeks ago, I finally slowed down enough to hear God speak. I remembered how when we first started talking about needing a new roof, I kept asking the Trustees (this was before we changed leadership structures), "But why do we need a roof? What can happen in this church that can't happen somewhere else? Why do we need this building? COVID showed us we can "be church" and worship from anywhere!"

But these questions/comments were consistently met with blank/confused stares: "Pastor Heidi we need a roof that doesn't leak so that everything stays dry... so that the building doesn't crumble around us."

Well, yes—obviously. That's the practical answer.

But I was looking for something deeper... something missional.

Eventually, I stopped asking those questions, because I got tired of feeling like I was a crazy person talking another language. (It should be said: I don't fault the Trustees for giving me blank stares—it's a reasonable response, especially when you're a very practical, engineer-minded person, like many in that room!)

Then, last, I met with Joy Fenton-Jones (aka Joy Parker, who was at BUMC for 9 years) to talk about the building and our capital campaign. I had heard Joy share at a conference event about her work helping churches reimagine what's possible in and around their church buildings. And that sounded like something important to think about at BUMC right now!

During my meeting with Joy, God started to put all the pieces together (I thank Joy for helping me verbally process everything that was racing through my mind!):


With the support of more than 60 amazing volunteers, our kids will dive into powerful Bible stories each day—stories that remind us again and again that we can trust God to be with us in every situation.



The Reinstatement of Ordination Service

Sunday, July 6 at 6 pm - First United Methodist Church, Cuyahoga Falls

In 2024, after <u>more than a half century of debate and defiance</u> over the place of LGBTQ people in the denomination, General Conference delegates — by sizable majorities — voted to end decades-old bans on <u>the ordination of "self-avowed practicing" gay clergy</u> and <u>the officiation of same-sex weddings</u>.

Jennifer Wellington and Michael Alexander will regain their United Methodist ordination credentials during a joyous worship service hosted by the Board of Ministry at First United Methodist Church in Cuyahoga Falls (245 Portage Trail). You are invited to the celebration.

Bishop Sally Dyck will be preaching, and Revs. Wellington and Alexander will be speaking. We will celebrate Holy Communion and enjoy special music from a choir directed by Rev. Joy Fenton-Jones. A fellowship gathering with light refreshments will follow the service.

For those who are unable to attend, the service will be live streamed on the First United Methodist Church of Cuyahoga Falls Facebook page (<u>@firstchurchcf</u>) and YouTube channel (<u>@firstchurchcuyahogafalls</u>).

About the speaker

Bishop Dyck is a retired episcopal leader of The United Methodist Church, having served from 2004 to 2020. She previously oversaw the

Northern Illinois Annual Conference (2012-2020) and the Minnesota Conference (2004-2012). She currently serves as the Ecumenical Officer of the Council of Bishops. Ordained an elder in the East Ohio Conference, Bishop Dyck pastored churches there and served as a district superintendent in the Wooster area. She earned a master of divinity degree from Boston University School of Theology and a certificate from the Ecumenical Institute, a joint program of the World Council of Churches and the University of Geneva, Switzerland. She is the author of <u>A Hopeful Earth: Faith, Science, and the Message of Jesus</u> (with Sara Ehrman; Abingdon, 2010) and <u>A Faithful Heart: Daily Guide for Joyful Living</u> (both published by Abingdon Press, 2010). Deeply committed to justice, she worked for full inclusion of the church, immigration reform, women's and racial justice, climate justice, and peacemaking as essential to discipleship. She runs daily and enjoys traveling with her husband, retired elder Rev. Ken Ehrman.

We have a fantastic vision frame-- our mission, values, strategy, and measures. But we don't have a clear picture of the next 3-5 years to put inside that frame (like a picture in a picture frame... get it?). And if we don't have a clear picture of what God is calling us to do at BUMC in the next 3-5 years, then why should we spend \$1M+ on our building? We need a clear vision for what God is calling us to as a church community and how God is calling us to use our physical building.

Add in that we've just experienced the loss of Dana, a friend/colleague/mentor/staff member, and that we will need to hire an additional staff person.

And, that the world has been and continues to change at lightning speed--particularly for us, in regards to how people relate to the church, and what they need from the church.

Leadership Board already planned to have a consultant come in to help us with visioning, goal setting, and thinking through our program staff needs. So, what if we paused our progress on the capital campaign for a moment and focused on vision, goals, etc.? Then, when we come to the congregation with our capital campaign ask, we'll have a full picture of what we're asking for and why!

So I talked with Alan, our Leadership Board Chair, and he was getting a similar nudge. Then, we met with our Capital Campaign work group that night, and they agreed that a vision-first approach makes logical and missional sense. So with Leadership Board's blessing, that is what we're going to do.

Why am I telling you all this? Why am I showing you how the proverbial sausage is made? Well, because I think it's important that our church community knows that at BUMC, we listen to the Spirit... even if it's not convenient or doesn't fit our timeline.

AND, we need your help-- in the coming weeks/months, we need your prayers and we need your insight into our community. What are you and your friends struggling with? What passion has God laid on your heart? How can we reimagine our building to create a "community commons?" Leadership Board will be providing different opportunities for you to share your insights and thoughts, so that together we can do the incredible things we haven't even imagined yet, but God already has planned!


