When school is out and families are taking summer vacations it may seem a bit quieter at church. But, there are still plenty of opportunities for community connection through Brecksville UMC.

In June, Eric and I participated in Cleveland Pride. It was an absolutely wonderful day. Our group was small: Linda Crouch, Charles and Jamie Schwendeman, Eric and me. The parade took about 1 ½ hours, and we walked along with other local churches. There were just as many people watching the parade as there were walking in it, an extremely positive display of love and support. We didn't stay for the after party, but there were lots of booths, musicians and speakers lined up for the afternoon.

The following weekend, we attended Pride Fest in Broadview Heights, another new experience for us. The BUMC booth was lots of fun! We had candy, stickers, and other giveaways. Cameron Wasie hosted a beading station, where people could make bracelets. I had several interesting discussions with people who go to other churches but wanted to learn more about how we got to where we are in supporting events like Pride Fest and the process that our congregation went through to become a reconciling church. It was very exciting to tell our story of becoming a reconciling church 11 years ago and experiencing the many ways our church family has grown since then. I walked away from the event feeling that we are making a difference – that we are known in our community for being intentionally welcoming to all.

What's More Productive?

My favorite part of VBS is the conversations I get to have.

This year, I introduced the bible story each morning at the "morning assembly," and then Jenny didn't have anything specific for me to do, so I got to spend the rest of the day walking around, checking out the different stations, and talking with the volunteers and participants. Sometimes the conversations were deep—talking through something they were struggling with; but mostly they were about how their day was yesterday, their vacations, funny stories, and what's keeping them active this summer.

Towards the end of the week, as my to-do list had somehow gotten longer rather than shorter, I wondered to myself: "Is this the best use of my time? I would be more 'productive' if I went to the office to work rather than 'hanging out."

But then I reminded myself that so much of the ministry "business" is relational—understanding what's going on in peoples' lives, helping each person know that they are loved and important by giving them some of my time. It's not often I get to hang out with almost 200 people for a few hours each day, learning about their passions and struggles, hopes and fears. (And get to blow bubbles with Casimer, give Gavin the stink-eye, and be a backup dancer to Machala!)

It reminded me of when I first got to BUMC and I did a dozen or so Home Gatherings. Basically, I asked people to host a group of their church friends so that I could get to know them, learn what they loved at BUMC, and their dreams for the future. Because of those Home Gatherings, I was able to learn pretty quickly about the people of BUMC. Then, when COVID shut everything down a few months later, I was able to use that knowledge to "pastor from afar."

This fall, we're bringing back the concept of Home Gatherings as we discern what picture we want to put inside our vision framework—what God is calling us to live into in the next 3-5 years. The gatherings will be slightly different, since the purpose is a bit different. I won't lead all of them—I'll host a few, and I'll guide some of our church leaders so they can lead others. Just like before, we'll ask different people to host, in order to get a good cross-section of BUMCers. And we'll have a couple of "Church Home Gatherings" where anyone is welcome to come and participate in the conversation.

What's a PEF?

We have the Annual Budget- which covers things like utilities, staff salaries, taxes, and more. And then we have the **Planned Expense Fund** for the things we can predict we'll need, but we can't predict exactly when we'll need them- like building updates, painting, plumbing repairs, and computer upgrades to keep up with ever-changing technology... The PEF is an important part of our church's financial health, and although it's not part of the annual budget, it is part of our annual stewardship. Or, write "Planned Expense Fund" on the memo line of your check or offering envelope, and we'll make sure it gets to the right place. We are so grateful for gifts that help us keep this Fund healthy and ready for whatever need comes next!



Parking Lot Repaving Is Here!

Potholes, widening cracks, dips, freeze/thaw damage, and crumbling asphalt. After many years of reliable service, our parking lot asphalt is failing. Further delay would require much more extensive and expensive repairs.

By the time you read this, our contractor will have ground down the old asphalt 2 inches, applied 2 new layers of fresh asphalt, and re-striped the parking lot. In the future, we will have the new lot seal coated every other year, and it should last far into the future.

Leadership Board approved a contract with Infinity Paving of Northfield Center for \$72,400. That was the lowest of 4 bids received. Leadership Board also approved using money from the **Planned Expense Fund** to complete the project. (See sidebar to learn more about the PEE.)

After that expense, the Planned Expense Fund will still have \$40,000. To rebuild the Planned Expense Fund for the future of our wonderful church building and parsonage, we hope to replenish that Fund through the upcoming capital campaign.

Good planning and care for our Building on the Square enables all of us to be involved in ministry locally, in the community, and far beyond. It's our springboard for getting off our donkeys and serving others.

Retirement Plan Contribution Corrections

We are extremely grateful that Finance Director, Shannon Kantorowski, discovered a contribution oversight that had been growing for almost 7 years. A number of our employees voluntarily participate in a 403(b) plan that our church participates in. That plan is an equivalent of a 401(k) plan.

For each eligible lay employee who participates at the minimum designated level, Brecksville UMC makes an employer matching contribution. Between our church's prior miscoding of data delivered to our payroll service, and our lack of informing the 403(b) plan that our lay employee's compensation increased each year, our church

under-contributed to the plan. We were stuck contributing at 2017 levels, not at each subsequent

year's actual levels. Contribution errors are actually not unusual. The IRS even has a corrective program for just this type of situation. And the 403(b) plan administrator has an online tool to help calculate the corrective amounts due.

As soon as Leadership Board learned of the problem, we resolved to fully correct it. Using the IRS corrective program as our guide, the church provided additional contributions for the affected employees equal to 50% of the employee's missed voluntary contributions, plus 100% of the church's matching contributions related to the full missed employee contributions, plus an amount equal to the lost earnings for that time period. The total corrective cost was \$12,477.81.

June 30 Financial Statement

We are pleased to present the June 30 Financial Statement for Brecksville United Methodist Church. We are on track in many categories, even before the main 2025 Alternative Revenue events kick in. We are still projecting a budget deficit for the year, but some progress is being made.

Our Finance Director, Shannon Kantorowski, who joined our staff this year, is helping us in many ways better track our finances. She regularly asks, "why do you do it that way," and "why is this here?" That has helped us better understand some deeper details about our church's finances, and make numerous improvements.

Previously, we used a frustratingly antiquated financial software program. We are transitioning to Quickbooks, which is giving us many new capabilities. Quickbooks allows us to generate new reports, and better ways to analyze our data. Continues on page 7. See "Financial Statement"

With this article is one of the new financial report formats. Our total income/giving is at 53% of budget, which is right on target for half way through the year. And our revenue is slightly over our current expenditures as well. That feels like a win!

Our office and administrative expenses are higher than budget, due to some unexpected computer equipment needs, the full payment of a service contract for the year, and increased fees in keeping some of our financial software open for our annual internal audit for 2024.

Our employee wages and costs are slightly lower than budget, due in great part to the tragic passing of our beloved Dana Schwendeman. We miss Dana dearly. Please think of Dana every time you see a butterfly.

The Missions budget was fully expended to help fund the terrific Rise Against Hunger event, where together we packaged 35,000 meals that have since been shipped to the Philippines. Such fun. Yay BUMC!

As we complete the transition to Quickbooks, and make additional refinements, we may find even better ways to report the information to you. Our goal is for everyone to be informed about our church finances.

If you haven't met Shannon, please drop by the church office on Tuesdays and Sundays, introduce yourself, and feel free to ask any questions you have about BUMC finances. Shannon is delightful, very willing to answer questions, and a great resource.

this year to add a mission station, where the kids packed 1,350 food items, 1,400 diapers & wipes and about 200 hygiene kits for Trials for Hope.

This leads me to our capital campaign. Yes, our building and our grounds require maintenance, and our building is an important part of our ministry. As we ask members of our church family to contribute to the needs of our church building and our ministries, we want to be sure we are intentional about the campaign. We believe we need to seek input from community members, consultants and, most important, you. This will delay our timing, but we believe it is important to do our homework about all the ways we can improve our building and use it to connect with the community in ways we haven't even imagined yet. Stay tuned ... we will provide more information soon.
