There is a video series that explains religions, and those segments can be used, if needed/wanted, or some ideas are also linked in this document.

Ideas for long-term "extras":

The *I Need Box*: At the beginning of each Youth Group, every kid writes a need on a sheet of paper and puts it in the box-if it says they need a hug, someone can reach out to their parents, if there's a monetary/item need, we try to figure out how to help, if they need to talk to someone, we arrange it, if they need a friend to go see a movie with, we try to find someone who wants to go, if they need help with school, we try to find them help....just a way of giving the kids a safe way to say what they need and trying to help with that. Or, maybe use Rose, Bud, Thorn weekly?

The College Connection: Each month the group gets the name of a college student and brings in things to put in a box to send to them, write notes to them, etc. and then send the box as a little pick me up from the Youth Group.
